## Township Residents' Giant Headache

### *Lawsuits Hamper Progress on Food Store*

**E**AST BRANDYWINE TOWNSHIP residents continue to be frustrated since Stauffer's Market (formerly Cropper's Market) closed suddenly in September of 2015. Residents have been hoping for progress on a proposed project by Carlino Land Development to build a Giant Food Store. Unfortunately, the planned project is still held up on multiple appeals by the neighboring property owners (Brandywine Village Associates and L&R Partnership, "BVA/L&R").



There have been two major developments in this saga. First, on January 6, 2017, the Chester County Court of Common Pleas issued a written Opinion and Order, ruling on Carlino's second plan and many of the major issues between the parties, concluding that in each instance the Township either handled the issue appropriately or that BVA/L&R waived consideration of the issue. Although the Court was considering the second plan filed by Carlino, many of the same objections to the plan were raised by BVA/L&R with respect to the third plan currently before the Board of Supervisors. Second, the same Court also lifted the stay entered on August 22, 2016 which prevented the Township from moving forward with its review of the third application of Carlino East Brandywine LP for the proposed Giant.

At a public meeting of the Township Board of Supervisors on January 18th, 2017, the Board heard a request by BVA/L&R for more public hearings before they consider Final Plan Approval of the latest development plan by Carlino. The third plan is in many respects identical to the second plan. Attorneys for BVA/L&R have indicated there are four or five issues with the plan which have not been previously raised or discussed. At the same meeting, a spokesperson for Carlino requested that the Board move forward towards Final Plan approval, given Carlino's assertions that (a) the Final Development Plan

## Community Pride In Local First Responders

*East Brandywine Township Police and East Brandywine Fire Company continue to improve their capabilities to serve our fast-growing community. In this issue of the Milemarker, we highlight some of the latest achievements.*

### CHIEF OF POLICE, MARK KOCSI

Chief Kocsi recently completed the Mid-Atlantic Law Enforcement Executive Development Seminar (MALEEDS) in Princeton, NJ. This seminar has been held at Princeton University each year since 1993, providing a unique leadership training opportunity for police chiefs and law enforcement executives. It is recognized as one of the premier selective law enforcement leadership training programs in the nation. Participation is by invitation only, and is awarded through an exceptionally competitive application process.



### POLICE ACHIEVE ACCREDITATION

The Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program was first introduced in July 2001. The East Brandywine Township Police Department became the 107th police department in Pennsylvania to earn this accreditation in October, 2016. Accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of helping institutions evaluate and improve their overall performance. The cornerstone of this strategy is establishing standards containing clear statements of professional objectives. A team of independent professionals are assigned to verify that all applicable standards have been successfully implemented. Benefits of accreditation include clear standards, potential insurance savings, stronger community relations, and increased employee input, interaction and confidence in the agency.

### NEW MULTI-MUNICIPAL FIRE FUNDING AGREEMENT AND FIRE SERVICES TAX

East Brandywine Township Board of Supervisors worked with their counterparts in West Brandywine Township and Upper Uwchlan Township, along with the East Brandywine Fire Company, to establish a Multi-Municipal Funding Agreement. This agreement provides a clear funding formula based on property values, popula-

tion, and emergency calls for service. The agreement ensures the municipal contributions are fairly distributed and will help create a more sustainable funding mechanism for the Fire Company. Because the Fire Company is an independent, and 100% volunteer organization, they rely on contributions from the municipalities they serve, and contributions from area residents and businesses. To meet its new higher funding obligations under the new Multi-Municipal Agreement, the Board of Supervisors also made changes to the Township's funding mechanism—acting to repeal the Fire Hydrant Tax (assessed on properties near fire hydrants) and enacting a new Fire Services Tax on all non-exempt properties in the Township. #### EAST BRANDYWINE FIRE COMPANY RECOGNIZED

On December 21, 2016, Police Chief Mark Kocsi presented a plaque to Fire Chief John Edwards for the East Brandywine Fire Company in recognition of their professionalism, support and teamwork. In 2016, the Fire Company responded to 758 emergencies and logged 2795 hours of time on incidents. The Fire Company is an all-volunteer organization, ordinary citizens who complete rigorous initial training and continual ongoing training so they can serve their fellow neighbors at a moment's notice.

#### POLICE PERSONNEL ON THE MOVE

- Officer Maureen Rae was promoted to a full-time Police Officer, and took the Oath of Office from District Justice Jeffrey Valocchi.
- Officers James Ferraro, Steven Liefholt, Glenn Mooney and Mark Twaddell were all promoted from Corporal to Sergeant.
- Officer Jeffrey Yankanich was promoted from Patrol Officer to Corporal.
- Commendations were presented to Detective Daniel Orris, Officer Cyle Harnish, Officer Juan Lemus, and Officer Maureen Rae for their activities on routine patrol in the 300 block of South Caldwell Circle. Officers detected a strong odor of burning marijuana, and after requesting backup, engaged three suspects in two vehicles in conversation leading them to conclude that drug activity had been taking place. After further investigation, Officers found in excess of two pounds of marijuana, \$1,630 in cash and other drug paraphernalia. The Officers were commended for their outstanding patrol alertness, their teamwork in developing information and probable cause for arrest and for their professionalism throughout the investigation.

is consistent with and cures all conditions imposed on the Preliminary Plan, and (b) BVA/L&R should not be able to raise the same objections that are already considered by the Board or any other objections that they could have raised at the time of the hearings on the third Preliminary Plan.

Based on these discussions, the Board agreed to hold an advertised Public Hearing to review any new objections that BVA/L&R have. The Board indicated it would only take evidence on issues that were not previously raised or considered, and that they do not intend to hear evidence on issues that have already been ruled upon by the Court.

Even if the Board grants Final Plan Approval on this third plan, BVA/L&R may choose to appeal once again. They have indicated that they plan to further appeal the January 6th decision regarding the second plan, and have an appeal pending which objects to the Township's condemnation of certain easements and land for a connector road.

In summary, while a lot has happened, there is still no clarity on when the development of a new Giant Food Store might begin until BVA/L&R drops their opposition to the project in the courts, or until final rulings are received which are not subject to appeal.

### NEW SECURE TAX COLLECTION BOX

NOW YOU CAN pay your sewer or real estate tax bill 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Just drop your payment in the secure collection box in the Township Municipal Building located at 1214 Horseshoe Pike. Look for the box in the vestibule between the center entry doors. Your cancelled check is your receipt of payment.



### BUILDING PERMITS AND STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

IT HAS NOW been almost three years since the Board adopted Ordinance 1 of 2014, the revision to our Stormwater Management Ordinance, as required by our Municipal Separate Storm Sewer (MS4) permit. In these three years, staff has worked closely with Cedarville Engineering Group, the Township's Stormwater Engineer, and with individuals making permit applications to translate the complicated new reality of our new stormwater management obligations into a system of standard administrative procedures.

As with any new program, this has been a learning experience for all involved. The most common negative applicant feedback has focused on the length of time to obtain a permit and associated costs to do so. The two concerns are closely associated--unlike other Township permit processes where Township fees for plan review are flat, the associated costs for the review of post-con-



struction stormwater management features of a plan are paid from an escrow account established by the applicant. Any "revise and resubmit" notices from the Township both delay eventual permit approval and increase the total cost of a permit.

In an effort to increase the likelihood that plan submissions are correct the first time, Township Staff is now piloting a program to make our Township Stormwater Engineer available to residents before they make application for stormwater permits. Bryan Kulakowsky from Cedarville will now be available by appointment on Wednesday afternoons to meet with residents and/or their engineers for a one-time hour appointment at no cost to the resident regarding the stormwater requirements of their planned projects. Township staff is also working with Cedarville on a revision to the current Ordinance which would create a basic stormwater management feature that residents could use for projects which create less than 2,000 square feet of impervious surface.

### TOWNSHIP ROAD WORK

THE 2016 ROAD Bid Project was completed November 8th This work involved repairing and overlaying Buck Road, East Buck Road and North Bailey Road. The Road Department has received numerous compliments on the paving project.



The lowest bidder was Pennsy Supply of Annville PA, whose bid was \$313,116.62. The final invoice is \$326,337.10 due to some additional base repair needed to prepare these roads for repaving. 2017 anticipated road

projects include Zynn Road, Lenora Lane, Newlin Drive, Caln Meetinghouse Road and Red Maple Drive. Also included are Phase I of Hawthorne Drive and bridge deck repairs to Lyndell Bridge.

### 2017 TOWNSHIP DOCUMENT SHREDDING AND ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

THE EVENT WILL be held on Saturday, April 8th, from 9:00am to noon at the K-Mart in Thorndale, Business Route 30 and Bailey Road.

The event is free to residents of East Brandywine, South Coatesville Borough, Coatesville City, Caln, West Bradford, West Brandywine and Valley Townships.




Document Shredding is limited to 4 boxes per person. Electronics collection will end when the truck is full. Accepted electronics include computers, LCD/LED monitors, laptops, printers, cell phones, iPods, cables, open toner cartridges, networking equipment, digital cameras, and DVD/VCR players. CRT (cathode ray tube) televisions and monitors, and LCD/LED televisions will be accepted, but will be subject to a fee of \$20 to \$40 depending on the size of the device.

Scouts from Hopewell BSA Troop 8 will be onsite to assist. Any other residents are welcome to help, as this is a large effort!

## Intersection Improvements at Bollinger Road & Horseshoe Pike

**S**INCE 2010, THE Township has been pressing Pulte Homes to permit and construct the roadway and intersection improvements at Bollinger Road and Horseshoe Pike. At a coordination meeting held here in January 2012, PennDOT expressed concern about coordination of the roadway improvements between the Applecross, Mapleview (formerly known as Applevue), and the proposed East Brandywine Center (Giant Supermarket) projects. All three developments will have traffic impacts on this section of Horseshoe Pike.

On January 9th, Township representatives met with representatives of Traffic Engineer McMahon & Associates, Pulte Homes, and Mapleview to discuss the Bollinger Road / Horseshoe Pike intersection improvements. McMahon has devised a phasing plan where the intersection improvements can be approved and constructed without waiting for the East Brandywine Center final plan approval, and the continuing legal issues which have delayed this project from proceeding forward.

Township Manager Scott Piersol has communicated the Township's support of this phased roadway improvement plan to PennDOT. PennDOT agrees with this phased approach, and expects to be able to review and approve Pulte's revised HOP plans later this year. Pulte still needs to acquire additional right-of-way on the Weaver tract, the southeast corner of Bollinger Road and Horseshoe Pike. Once Pulte has acquired the additional right-of-way, their Highway Occupancy Permit (HOP) can be approved and proceed to construction, possibly in the Fall of 2017, but more likely in the Spring of 2018. This project includes widening of the roadway, turn lanes, and a traffic signal.

Mapleview will proceed to construct their roadway improvements on the north side of the intersection once approvals are given by PennDOT and the Township. The Pulte and Mapleview roadway improvements can be phased independently. Neither roadway improvement project will create a significant problem for the East Brandywine Center roadway improvements, other than some milling and adjusting the markings on the roadway in front of the shopping centers. The improvements for each development are shown in the plan above, highlighted in blue (Applecross), green (Mapleview) and red (East Brandywine Center).
