CALLING ALL BUTTERFLY LOVERS!

Monarch and swallowtail butterflies were among the first visitors to the new butterfly garden at the entrance to the Township's Bondsville Mill Historic Park and Nature Trails. Sandy Moser, a member of the Bondsville Mill Park Committee, says the garden came together when a large patch of milkweed was discovered as workers installed the new sign to mark the entrance of the park.

The milkweed plant is critical to the survival of the Monarch butterfly as it is the only plant the Monarch will lay its eggs on. Milkweed is the only plant its caterpillars can eat.

Moser, along with committee member Doug Freeman, planted other important "host" plants in the gardens as well. A host plant is one that the butterfly will lay eggs on because its caterpillars will have food to eat right away.

The garden also has a selection of plantings that will provide pollinators and nectar for the butterflies. Purple coneflowers, goldenrod, milkweeds, and beebalm are star attractors for the Monarchs and various Swallowtail butterflies.

The entrance has a stepping stone path and painted tree stumps to sit on to view the butterflies. The garden area will be educational as well. Plans are to install a kiosk with photos of types of butterflies the plants will attract. Stop by soon to relax, enjoy the butterflies, and the garden.

The Metamorphosis of Bondsville Mill Historic Park

A stop in this year's Chester County Day on October 7th!

HAVE YOU BEEN out to the Bondsville Mill Historical Park and Nature Trails, yet?! If not, Fall is the perfect time to explore the park. East Brandywine Township is home to one of a select few parks in the region that provides its visitors a combination of a historical and natural experience. The Park is a local "walk in the woods" right in our own backyard. Open from dawn to dusk, it provides two miles of walking trails where you can experience wild life in its natural habitat. (Of note, birders have identified 32 species of birds in the Park!) It is located on Bondsville Road, near the Township's southern border with Caln Township. The Park has been open to the public since the Fall of 2014 with the formal dedication in June 2015.



The garden area at the entrance to the Park provides a respite for visitors and butterflies. The trails are open dawn to dusk.

Since the purchase of the park land in 2005, a tremendous amount of work has been completed by volunteers to reach the stage for safe public access. Substantial progress continues to be made for people to be able to enjoy the setting of the Park thanks to the consistent and steady dedication of our volunteers. Since the Park's opening:

- The trail system (started before the Park opening) is now complete and properly marked, including several loops through different areas of the Park. The Stops & Starts of the Giant Grocery Store

Conditional Final Approval granted by Board of Supervisors

THE PROCESS CONTINUES for moving forward to bring the Giant grocery store to East Brandywine. And then at times, it stops again. Here is a summary of activity from this summer:

- In June, the Board of Supervisors (BOS) granted conditional final approval of the third plan submitted by Carlino East Brandywine (Carlino) to construct a Giant grocery store, bank, and other shops. Carlino is the developer of the Watters tract which is adjacent to the existing Brandywine Village shopping center. Carlino's proposed commercial development, including a Giant, is called the East Brandywine Center.

- In July, the Honorable Senior Judge Nagle issued an Opinion in the land use appeal filed by Brandywine Village Associates (BVA) and L&R Partnership (L&R) after the Township granted conditional preliminary approval for the East Brandywine Center project. BVA and L&R are the owners of the parcels to the east and northeast of the proposed East Brandywine Center. Judge Nagle's thirty-six (36) page Opinion includes a detailed and impartial history of the case and concludes that the "...Board did not err in approving Carlino's Plan for the 'East Brandywine Center' [Giant]..." A number of legal matters remain unresolved. For instance, BVA and L&R have again filed an appeal to the Chester County Court of Common Pleas challenging the Board's decision in granting Conditional Final Plan approval to the third plan in June. BVA and L&R have also filed Preliminary Objections to the condemnation of certain easements and land by the Township for a connector road. This case, also before the Chester County Court of Common Pleas, has yet to be decided. The bottom line is until final rulings which are not subject to appeal are received from the courts, or BVA/L & R drop the opposition to the project, Carlino East Brandywine cannot move forward on construction at the site.


VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES WITH EAST BRANDYWINE TOWNSHIP

- Signs have been installed to discuss the history of the Mill and label the trail systems.
- The entrance to the Park has been beautified with the Butterfly Garden and other floral plantings to provide a welcoming gateway (see page 1).
- The Mill Buildings have been stabilized and secured, with the oldest building (the former Spinning Room, Building A on the map) having significant progress made towards restoration. The intent is to use this building as an education center to discuss the Bondsville Mill, as well as, the regional mill activity along Beaver Creek.



The work at the Park has been accomplished primarily through the donation of time and labor by volunteers. The Township supports the effort by supplying materials and equipment. Additional support is obtained through grants from various sources including PECO. This year alone our volunteers have given hundreds of hours to the Park. As residents and others have become more aware of the park its popularity has significantly increased within the past year. Additionally, the historical significance of the Bondsville Mill has led to its inclusion as the keystone to a Mill District in an application submitted to the Pennsylvania Historic and Museum Commission (PHMC) for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

Future plans for use of the Park include:

EDUCATION

- The former Spinning Room will act as an education center for the Park and historic regional mill industry, and headquarters to the Beaver Creek Milling District, providing historical information to visitors, potentially including school groups.
- The natural area of the Park will provide a setting for nature clubs to visit and learn about the local flora and fauna of the area.

A LOCATION FOR COMMUNITY GROUP ACTIVITIES

- The large concrete pad where some of the former Mill buildings once stood will be developed into a setting to provide space for activities such as craft festivals.

The work has been planned and conducted under the watchful eye of the Bondsville Mill Park (BMP) Committee, an advisory body of volunteers who report to the Board of Supervisors and is, itself, divided into Construction, Trails, Nature, and Fundraising Committees, each with its own specific mission.

WE NEED YOUR SUPPORT!

THE BONDSVILLE MILL Park (BMP) Committee can always use more help, including assistance related to building restoration/stabilization, trail maintenance, gardening (removal of invasive species and planting of species native to the area), and marketing/fundraising. Volunteers meet:



- Weekly at the Park Monday morning
- One weekend a month

The BMP Committee meets at the Township Building every fourth Thursday of the month at 8:00 am.

One of the biggest ways you can help is through **FINANCIAL support**. While volunteers are always appreciated and necessary, so are funds to permit the acquiring of materials and services necessary to continue to improve the grounds and facilities. Tax deductible donations can be made to the Park through the East Brandywine Foundation, with the Bondsville Mill Park earmarked on the donation. Law and Regulations of Operating a Neighborhood Electric Vehicle (NEV)

EAST BRANDYWINE'S CHIEF of Police, Mark Kocsi calls them golf carts on steroids. Known as Neighborhood Electric Vehicles (NEV) they are different than your typical golf cart. And both are subject to Pennsylvania law.

Pennsylvania law allows persons to purchase and operate a Neighborhood Electric Vehicle (NEV) on state- or locally-maintained roadways. The most important thing to understand about an NEV is that these vehicles must be properly titled, registered, insured, have equipment installed by the manufacturer as outlined in the law (including seat belts), and have a minimum/maximum speed of 20 mph up to 25 mph.

Drivers of these vehicles must have a valid driver's license. The Pennsylvania Vehicle Code laws apply to NEV's including the DUI and accident reporting requirements.

One problem we are experiencing is with residents who think they own an "NEV" but they do not. There are many types and variations of golf carts / NEVs and it is important to understand that the ONLY one permitted on our roadways is one that meets ALL the requirements outlined in the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code.

WHERE NEV'S CAN BE OPERATED IN EAST BRANDYWINE TOWNSHIP

According to the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code, NEVs may only be driven on state or township maintained roadways that are no more than two lanes in width and the posted speed limit is 35 mph or less. (Turning lanes are counted for purposes of determining of width). The NEV law does not apply to private communities whose roadways are not dedicated to the Township.

One of these communities is Applecross. The Applecross HOA has worked very closely with the Police Department and Board of Supervisors to develop HOA rules and regulations that allow their residents to operate vehicles that do not meet state NEV standards but only on the private roads within their community.

If you are considering purchasing an NEV, it can be very difficult to determine if the NEV can be used on the roads between your home and intended destination without knowing road ownership, speed limits, and intersection design. Since these vehicles can be very expensive to purchase, license, and insure, we encourage HOA communities and residents to contact the Police Department prior to purchase so that we can guide you in understanding what the parameters will be for your specific circumstances.

For more information on NEVs refer to the Pennsylvania Motor Vehicle Code, Title 75, Chapter 35, Subchapter F (Neighborhood Electric Vehicles) Sections 3591 through 3596.

Township Tidbits

PERMIT REQUIRED FOR SECURITY SYSTEMS

AN ALARM DEVICE permit from the East Brandywine Police Department is required for home and business security systems and fire alarms. Any device that will communicate an emergency situation to the fire or police department, or ambulance service, through the 911 Center, and/or will activate a bell, siren, or alarm outside of a building, must be approved by the Police Department. For residential fire alarms, the owner has the option to have the alarm company call the premises before calling the 911 Center, in case the alarm was activated by accident. The 911 Center must also be notified when testing will occur for any alarm device. For more information refer to the Township code **ECODE360.COM/11879445#11879460** or call **(610) 269-8230**.



FEMA FLOODPLAIN MAPPING

THE FEDERAL EMERGENCY Management Agency (FEMA) has updated the Chester County Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM Map). This change will take effect on September 29, 2017. As the FIRM map determines if property owners are required to purchase flood insurance, East Brandywine Township wants residents to be informed of these changes. The Township cannot, however, make final determinations on whether a parcel is within a floodplain or if flood insurance will be required.

You can check to see if your property falls within a floodplain by going to **WWW.EBRANDYWINE.ORG/CIVICALERTS.ASPX?AID=110**. You can select one of the

three "panels" of the FIRM map that cover East Brandywine Township. For each panel, both 2006 maps and the new 2017 maps are available to view. Alternatively, you can use the ChescoViews GIS tool made available by Chester County at **HTTPS://ARCWEB.CHESCO.ORG/CV3/**. The floodplain "layer" may be activated by clicking the "TOC" button once the map has loaded.

BURNING & CAMPFIRES

Burning trash, recyclables, leaves, limbs, tree stumps or yard debris of any kind, whether in an open fire or in a barrel-type container, is strictly prohibited in the Township. Backyard recreational fires such as an open campfire or using an outdoor fireplace or similar device is permitted upon issuance of a campfire permit from the Township.

When dry weather conditions warrant, the Township may ban any outdoor fire. Notice of burning bans is made through the Township website and directly to all campfire permit holders. For more information and application for permits visit: **EBRANDYWINE.ORG/288/BURNING-CAMPFIRES**
