
All are welcome to make ornaments (we'll have the supplies) and then help us decorate the tree. Enjoy homemade cookies, hot chocolate, music, and fun.

*Meeting Hall Video Cameras Installed*

**L**IFE IS BUSY. And as much as residents would like to keep up with what is going on at Township meetings, for most, there just isn't time to attend in person. Now, however, East Brandywine Township residents can view the meetings from your home or office at a time more convenient for you. You can see and hear the actual decision-making process which occurs at Township meetings.



Videos can be viewed at the Township website.

In June 2017 two cameras were added to the Meeting Hall of the Township building to allow visual and audio access to government meetings. The system is operated in real time and there is no post-production editing. Luke Reven, Assistant Township Manager, operates the two pan-tilt-zoom cameras and microphones during the meeting.

## Saying Thanks to Those Who Volunteer

### David Summers Named Citizen of the Year

**A** COMMUNITY DOES NOT grow and thrive as East Brandywine has by government alone. Much of the activity in our Township is propelled by a squad of volunteers who assist with multiple activities.

On October 26, the East Brandywine's Annual Volunteer Appreciation dinner was attended by over 90 people. Township officials recognized the many volunteers who sit and chair various committees, help with our parks, youth programs, the fire department and other municipal activities.

All volunteers were recognized for the hours of work they commit to improving our Township. Specifically honored at the dinner were Arnie Kring, who is stepping down from his six-year term on the Board of Supervisors (see article on page 3) and David Summers, who was named East Brandywine Township's Citizen of the Year for 2017.

Dave began serving the Township as a Police Officer in 1975, rising to the rank of Sargent before changing course to pursue a career in banking. In 1988 he returned to the Township as a Supervisor and served in that position until 2000. He has served as Treasurer of the Municipal Authority since its inception in 1999.

One of his most significant contributions has been as a member of the Parks and Recreation Board. When Dave started with the Parks and Recreation Board in the early 1990's, there were a couple of small pocket parks scattered throughout the Township. Dave was an early proponent for a central, single park. Dave and Sandy Lammey have nurtured and developed the Community Park into the wonderful facility it is today. When the Township acquired the Bondsville Mill site, Dave volunteered to be a member of the Bondsville Mill Committee and served as its first Chairman. The park has developed into a historical resource as well as a wonderful place to explore the trails in the woods along Beaver Creek.

Our Township has been truly fortunate to have the benefit of Dave's energy, self-less commitment, and expertise. Thank you to Dave, Arnie, and all who devote time and resources to the development of East Brandywine Township. ## Around the Township—Arnie Kring COMPLETES SIX YEAR TERM AS TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR

RECALLS THE GROWTH AND TRANSFORMATION OF EAST BRANDYWINE

**I**N SEPTEMBER 1959, when Arnie, his wife Nelda, and their family, settled in Chester County the entire business district of Guthriesville consisted of Bob Cropper's grocery store (now the monument sales building on the corner), Flossie and Earl Bryant's luncheonette in the Victorian building next door, and Ernie Cozzone's gas station on the Hopewell Road corner.

Arnie recalls a fund-raising event where hunters roamed the farmer's fields and backwoods of East Brandywine Township as they hunted for rabbits, squirrels and pheasants.

This was Arnie's first view of our Township. How times have changed!

Arnie, a Korean War veteran, quickly became immersed in the local community serving 30 years as a principal in the Coatesville School District. And later as a realtor with Century 21. From 1998 until 2006, Arnie served as a Commissioner in Caln Township where he resided. During that time, he saw the development of many commercial and residential ventures.

In 2006 Arnie relocated to East Brandywine Township. He was elected as Vice Chairman to the East Brandywine Township Board of Supervisors in

2011, serving a six-year term which ends in December 2017. During these years Arnie has witnessed huge growth in the Township.

Arnie was instrumental in getting the electronic signboard visible on 322 at the Township building. The signboard, which advertises many events, activities and important dates, proved its worth when, after announcing a Township Red Cross blood drive, more blood donations than ever before were received. Our Township newsletter, The Milemarker, and website, are both state wide, award-winning forms of communication thanks to Arnie's input.

Arnie is proud of the work the East Brandywine Supervisors, along with the financial support of the community, have done to establish 1,350 acres of open space within the Township. He is also credited with supporting activities and plans for the Community Park, Bondsville Mill Park, and the trails development from Hibernia Park through

West and East Brandywine to the Struble Trail.

Arnie had hoped that during the time served as Supervisor a new grocery store would open in East Brandywine Township. Arnie states that, “We, as Supervisors, are charged with promoting the HEALTH, SAFETY and WELFARE of all

residents. Three times during these past six years, permission was granted by your Supervisors for the establishment of a grocery store and a safer means of vehicle and passenger transport from North Guthriesville Road to the traffic signal on 322 at the shopping center. Three times this same permission was appealed with rulings granted by the Chester County Court of Common Pleas in favor of the Township. We are now witnessing the give-and-take of the third appeal so perhaps, finally, your Supervisors will find that our Township will survive the third round and positive progress may finally be accomplished.”

When Arnie and Nelda settled in our Township population was 1,618. Our Township population today is 7,820. Arnie believes there is no finer place to live, raise a family and generally enjoy life and nature, than in our lovely Township.

We thank you, Arnie, for your care and service for our community!

## Spatola Park

*Creating Memories for Generations of Families*

**S**PATOLA PARK WAS one of the first official parks in East Brandywine Township thanks in large part to Joseph Spatola, Jr., who donated the land for the park in 1965. As a businessman from Philadelphia, Joseph moved to East Brandywine Township in the late 50's and settled on what is now the Orvilla Farm in Lyndell. Mr. Spatola centered his energy on building homes and developing tracks of land while staying involved in the Spatola family's wine business (sales office) which was located at the corner of Route 322 and later Gloucester Drive.



A young Michael Mize, flanked by Philadelphia Philly Marty Bystrom, was at Spatola Park on opening day 1992 to celebrate the 10th Anniversary of EBVA. EBVA records show that in 1992 there were 425 baseball and softball registrations and 800 soccer players.


One of Mr. Spatola's real estate projects was the development of Gloucester Drive at Route 322 where initially 20 homes were built. A tract of land to the northeast side of the property was not developed. In 1965, Mr. Spatola donated 4 acres of that undeveloped tract to the Township with the stipulation that it be used for a park. The Township purchased additional acreage of adjoining property in 1978.

Spatola Park was developed by Township Staff and many very energetic, dedicated parents who had a vision. Spatola Park doubled as a baseball field and a soccer field for many years. 1980 was the first year the Park was used for organized sports. Tee ball was played at the Township Building. Farm League for 8-9 year olds was played at Brandywine Wallace School. And, the 10-12 year olds graduated to Spatola Park which had a real backstop and eventually dugouts! From the memory banks of a 12-year old baseball player, "I have lots of great memories of Spatola Park, Dad's Root Beer, and a baggy of 1 cent Swedish fish."

Robert "Bob" Spatola, son of Joseph Spatola, Jr. and wife Hanna have lived in Lyndell since 1972 raised 4 children and now have 10 grandchildren and 3 great grandchildren.

Bob has followed in his father's footsteps as a friend and generous contributor to Spatola Park and is also well known for his great support of the Handi-Crafters in Thornedale. The Spatola family has maintained businesses in East Brandywine Township since the mid-1960's and they continue today (Farmer in Lyndell—Tree Farm). We thank the Spatola family for their many years of generosity and support.

## Before the Snow Falls!



**I**T'S INEVITABLE THAT snow will fall at least once this winter. East Brandywine Township takes great pride in its ability to quickly and safely clear the snow from the Township's many roadways. Our residents, too, play a key role in snow removal. Before the first storm, please take these steps to help make it easier for snow removal:

- Make sure the front of your mailbox is at least four to six inches behind the front of the curb (or edge of the road) and mounted at a height of four feet.
- Trim tree branches hanging over the road.
- Consider installing driveway markers.
- Keep cul-de-sac and roads free of parked cars from the time snow starts until the roads are cleared.

When the snow falls .... When shoveling your driveway, leave the last six feet of your drive unshoveled until street plowing is complete. This unshoveled part will allow the snow being pushed by the plow to remain on the plow and not dumped into your drive. If you must shovel out your drive, clear a six-foot area of the road that is directly in front of the mouth of your drive. In addition, clear an area ten feet before and after the mouth of your drive, so that when the plow comes through, it will unload snow that it is pushing into the cleared area and not in the mouth of your driveway. Use the image above as a guide for shoveling before roadways have been cleared.

### LATEST COURT RULINGS ON GIANT PROJECT

On September 7, 2017, the Honorable Edward Griffith issued a decision in the action filed by the Township in 2014 to condemn certain land and easements to construct a connector road from Route 322 Horseshoe Pike through to North Guthriesville Road.

Brandywine Village Associates ("BVA"), the owner of the existing shopping center, and L&R Properties, the owner of the property to the rear of the shopping center, had initially filed over 35 preliminary objections to the condemnation action and later added an additional objection. After two years of delay and then seven (7) days of hearings on BVA's objections to the condemnation, Judge Griffith concluded that the preliminary objections had no merit and overruled all of them, dismissing the challenge.

Following Judge Griffith's ruling, on September 21, 2017, the Honorable Ronald C. Nagle issued another decision in the series of pending cases arising from the Giant land development.

In 2011, BVA filed a lawsuit against Carlino, the developer attempting to construct the Giant store, and various members of the Watters family, who still own the land. The lawsuit requested the Court interpret the various easements on the Watters land created to facilitate construction of the BVA shopping center, in a manner that would prohibit the construction of the Giant. Judge Nagle concluded that the arguments made by BVA had "no merit" and dismissed their complaint.

EBYA SOCCER IS a recreational soccer program for kids from ages 4 to 18, serving the entire area. We have two seasons—Spring (registration opens on January 1st) and Fall (registration opens on July 1st). Each season is 10 weeks long with a practice on one weeknight per week and a game on Saturdays.

Our soccer program has nearly doubled in the past few years with participation increasing from 500 kids each season to an average of 1,000 kids each of the past four seasons. All practices and games occur at the Community Park with 45 games scheduled every Saturday this Fall.

Our soccer program is 100% volunteer and we are always looking for more volunteers whether to help with equipment and fields or to help coach our teams. You do not need to have a child in the soccer program to volunteer. These volunteer roles are ideal for high school students looking for service hours toward a senior project or retirees who would like to be more involved with the community.

### PECO AWARDS \$1,000

### PERMIT IS REQUIRED FOR FLOODPLAIN PROPERTIES

ON SEPTEMBER 29, 2017 FEMA revised federal floodplain regulations went into effect. Residents whose properties are located in or along a floodplain cannot install any structure, fence or make other changes without obtaining permit approval from the Township. Please take time to review the maps to be sure your property is not affected by these changes.

The twenty-three (23) page Decision provides a comprehensive background on the controversy, including the fact that the sewer easement was now unnecessary because the easement specifically required BVA to connect to the municipal sewer system when it became available. Since BVA has now connected, there was no further need for the sewer easement. Judge Nagle also referenced the recent decision of Judge Griffith dismissing the objections of BVA to the condemnation of the remaining stormwater and access easements.

## Recycling & Trash Programs

### RECYCLING

**THURSDAY** is the pick up day for curbside recycling removal.

In 2016 Township, with assistance from the PA Department of Environmental Protection, purchased and distributed new containers, also called "Toters," to all residents except those in townhomes without garages. Call the Township at (610) 269-8230 to report lost, damaged, or missing Toters.

The Township has two sizes of recycle Toter: 35- and 64-gallon. Most homes have the 64-gallon variety. Homes with very long driveways, and the homes of senior citizens or individuals with mobility disabilities may request the smaller size.

All residents must participate in our recycling program per PA law. Recycling also significantly reduces the Township's tipping fees for garbage at the landfill--Keeping your annual fees low!

The annual fee for recycling is only \$70.00 per residence.

### RECYCLABLE ITEMS

#1 thru #7 plastics: Such as milk, water and soda bottles; laundry care products; and food containers.

Clear, green & brown glass: Such as beer, liquor and soda bottles as well as food jars

Aluminum, steel & tin: Such as beverage and food cans.

Mixed paper: Such as newspapers, magazines, phone books, catalogs, cereal boxes, grocery bags, home or office paper, books, envelopes, letters, junk mail, wrapping paper, and similar paper products.

Cardboard (small boxes): These must be flattened and tied.

Very large corrugated or cardboard boxes must be flattened and taken to the East Brandywine Township building (**not accepted at curbside**).

### PREPARING RECYCLABLES

Cans, bottles, jars and plastics should be rinsed clean.

Compress plastics and cans to reduce volume; do not break glass.

### CURBSIDE PICK UP

Place recyclables at curbside on **WEDNESDAY** evening or before 5:30 A.M. Thursday morning for pick up **THURSDAY**.

### TRASH REMOVAL

**THURSDAY** is the pick up day for both curbside recycling and trash removal.

Annual fee for trash removal is only \$165.00 per residence.

### WEEKLY TRASH PICK UP

Put your trash at curbside on **WEDNESDAY** evening or early **THURSDAY** morning; the hauler starts at 5:30 A.M.

Weekly limit is the equivalent of three 35 gallon containers or bags from each residence.

May substitute one three foot by three foot securely tied bundle for one 35 gallon container or bag.

As the Township will pay landfill tipping fee (the cost per ton cost to use the landfill), The hauler will strictly enforce the limit.

By recycling, you can avoid exceeding the allowable amount of trash. Paper accounts for 35% of our waste.

### BULK TRASH PICK UP

Bulk Trash accepted on the last pick up day of each month.

One large item permitted each month, or the equivalent of two 35 gallon or bags in addition to weekly limit.

Weight limited to an item two people can easily lift.

### ACCEPTABLE BULK TRASH

Furniture, small appliance, water heater, or similar item.

Any air conditioner, refrigerator or freezer must display a sticker certifying the removal of the refrigerant ("freon") by an authorized dealer or repair facility.

### UNACCEPTABLE TRASH

Automotive parts, tires, building materials, etc.

Leaves and similar compostable materials.

Christmas trees are accepted at the Municipal Complex after Christmas until late February for composting.

Items included in the Covered Device Recycling Act (Act 108) of 2010, namely: desktop computers; laptop computers; computer monitors; computer peripherals; tablets; televisions; and e-readers.

### YARD WASTE

The township offers leaf collection once in the spring and for three weeks in the fall (dates are always announced on [www.ebrandywine.org](http://www.ebrandywine.org)). For those collections, residents are encouraged to place leaves on their lawns within 6 feet of the edge of the road. Road crews then use a leaf vac to pick up all the leaves.

As a new service to residents, there will be an additional monthly pick-up of certain bagged yard waste during the spring through early fall. This service is offered six times a year-- typically on the last Saturday of the month. Please check the website for exact dates.

### HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE, DOCUMENT SHREDDING, & E-WASTE

### COMMERCIAL

Commercial Properties are those properties used primarily for commercial or industrial purposes.

All commercial properties must recycle aluminum cans, newspapers, plastic containers, and green, brown and clear glass containers, corrugated paper, and high-grade office paper. All commercial properties must contract with a licensed collector to provide recycle services OR utilize the Township's Curbside Service. To use the Township's Curbside Service commercial properties must meet both of these requirements:

- The volume of recyclable materials generated at the commercial establishment will fit in the Township-provided containers; and
- The commercial establishment has access to a curbside location.

Instructions for commercial properties who utilize the Township Curbside Recycle Service are the same those listed for residential customers.

All commercial establishments may use the recycle drop-off facility located at 1214 Horseshoe Pike.
