### JOHN HERSHEY'S VISION

OCT 21, 3:30 PM, TOWNSHIP BLDG

John Hershey, a force in the permaculture movement, was born around 1900. One of his homes and farm was on North Guthriesville Road in the area now occupied by the Villages at Timberlake. His vision was for a better kind of American farm, one that took full advantage of what he called "Orbit of Nature." He self-published "Nature's Obits, Mans Profit."

It was his work with J. Russell Smith, a professor at Wharton, that was the foundation of a movement known as permaculture. Presentation is by **Dale Hendricks**, a self-described "itinerant preacher on ecology and trees who tries to communicate new ideas, bring the young folks along, and have a little fun." He is the owner of Green Light Plants in Landenberg.

## Volunteer Spotlight—Sandra Lammey

*A Committed Volunteer to Our Parks*

**O**N A RECENT hot summer day at East Brandywine Community Park, **Sandy Lammey**, Chairperson of the Parks & Recreation Board, didn't seem to mind the heat at all. She radiated a relaxed, humble pride as she recalled many days helping transform this former farmland into the vibrant community park it is today.

“The vision was,” said Sandy, “to create a space for all ages and activities. Fields, paths, and trees. Benches and pavilions. We wanted it to be a ‘community’ space—not for just one particular sporting group or playground.” And the Park has indeed become the gathering space for Township residents.

In 2018 the Parks and Recreation Board planned a full schedule of activities at the Park. Three family movies, three concerts, Shakespeare in the Park, Community Day, Run for the Parks, the East Brandywine Fire Company's fireworks displays, the Harvest Festival, and Christmas Tree Lighting.

In 1989 when the Township's Board of Supervisors created the Parks and Recreation Board, they immediately invited life-long resident, Sandy Lammey, to join the group. At the time, Sandy was a physical education teacher for grades K-6 at Uwchlan Hills Elementary School. Her parents and grandparents were long-time residents and committed volunteers in East Brandywine Township. Sandy's mother, Ruth, was born above the Lyndell Store (now the Lyndell Post office) on Creek Road.

Sandy remembers riding her bicycle on the open roads of the Township as a child and stopping in at the first Cropper's market at the corner of Route 322 and Bondsville Road (now Weaver Memorials). When first approached by the Township about being on the committee, Sandy wasn't quite sure she understood the need for a planned place for play. The whole community was her playground. She did see, however, how the Township was changing from a rural, agricultural space to one dotted with growing housing developments. This new population had different needs. She wanted to be part of the group with the vision.

So, along with the three supervisors, one secretary, and the roadmaster at the time, a plan for a community park was developed. Together they recruited volunteers to plant all the trees (watered with gallon jugs of water brought from their homes), scatter

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the grass seed (literally by hand off the back of a truck), and create garden areas (cut out, planted, and maintained). Countless hours were spent filling out paperwork to apply for state and local grants, soliciting community clubs and residents for donations, and running fund raising events to create the first ball fields and playground.

“In the early days and lean years of the development of the park, many volunteers worked tirelessly and did many things,” recalls Dave Summers, Township Supervisor at the time. “Sandy contributed countless hours in support of park and recreational activities, drawing on her life experiences and her professional expertise. She possesses a drive and commitment to get things done—and if she has to do it herself—she will. She’s even been seen with a rake and shovel!”

About the time she retired from 35 years of teaching, Sandy become Chairperson

of the Parks and Recreation Board. It hardly sounds like retirement as Sandy oversees development planning and fundraising for all East Brandywine’s parks. These include Spatola Park, Hopewell Field, Bondsville Mill Park (although they have a separate committee), and Whittaker Trail Head on Creek Road at Dowlin Forge Road.

“The focus,” says Sandy, “will continue to be on events to raise funds to develop the parks. We want to build another bathroom at the north end of the Community Park. We want to add walking trails and install new playground equipment. We are working to have a parking lot at the Whittaker Trail Head and direct connection to the Struble Trail.”

Sandy personally meets with families and donors who want to dedicate benches at the parks to loved ones. She helps them select the site and the wording for the plaque placed on the bench. She also works closely with Eagle Scouts on their community projects to benefit our parks.

When Sandy’s father, Jay, died in 2001, donations made in his name helped to build the baseball field dedicated in 2004 as Jay Lammey Field. A fitting tribute to a dedicated volunteer who, along with his wife Ruth, instilled the same attributes in Sandy.

“Sandy continues to spearhead numerous projects and events,” says Summers. “Her dedication to the Township and all of its activities exemplify the qualities of a committed volunteer.”

Thank you, Sandy, for your hard work and dedication to East Brandywine Township.

## Guthriesville Walk Plan Is Denied by Board of Supervisors

*Amended Plan Was Not Compliant to Town Ordinance*

**T**HE PLANS OF Rouse/Chamberlain to develop and build 15 multi-family units on the property between Village Hardware and Guthriesville Plaza were denied in an August 2 Board of Supervisors Work session. The Board of Supervisors approved the use of townhomes on this site, but the site design did not comply with the terms of the Traditional Neighborhood Design (TND-1) district regulations contained in the East Brandywine Township Zoning Ordinance. The TND-1 District regulation is intended to "reflect and support the properties and uses that are predominant in the Village of Guthriesville," and to assure that new uses and the dimensional and design standards to which they must adhere are compatible with the traditional, compact neighborhood commercial character and complementary residential uses within the Village.

Some of the areas of where the amended plan was not compliant included:

- Front yard/build to lines of not more than 12 feet in depth from the right-of-way of Horseshoe Pike, therefore not forming a continuous streetscape as intended.
- Incompatibility with the residential uses on the south side of Horseshoe Pike.
- No off-street parking at the rear or side of the buildings.

## Carlino Submits Plan #4 for Giant Supermarket

**I**N JULY, THE Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania affirmed the previous Order by the Chester County Court of Common Pleas dismissing the objections filed by Brandywine Village Associates (BVA) and L & R Associates (L&R) to the condemnation of easements and land necessary for the construction of a new connector road between N. Guthriesville Road and Route 322. However, the Commonwealth Court found the previous plan did not provide the required 85-foot setback for a proposed bank at the site, and overturning the plan approval for that sole reason. Carlino Developers has submitted another plan for the East Brandywine Center. Formal presentation of this fourth plan version was expected at the September 5th public meeting of the Planning Commission. ## Bondsville Mill Park Continues to Grow!

*Gardens, Historic Buildings and Picnic Areas to Enjoy*


**B**ONDSVILLE MILL PARK is unique as it provides a combination of historical and natural experiences to its visitors. The Park continues to be a work in progress. The status ranging from what is complete to what is being planned includes:

- A two-mile trail system is complete, with regular maintenance.
- Signage marking the trails is complete, as is signage about basic Park info, the history of the Mill, and the butterflies that visit the Park.
- The rehabilitation of the former Spinning Room (Building A) of the Mill complex is 98% complete, having been completely enclosed and looking to obtain an occupancy permit to create our Education Center. Information about the Mill and the regional mill activity will be presented there.
- Significant progress has been made on rehabilitation of the Mill Building (Building C).
- Several theme gardens have been created focusing on native species, including: a Butterfly Garden, a Medicinal Garden (to provide a discussion of plants historically used for medical purposes), and flower gardens. A Shade Garden is planned for this Fall.
- Picnic Areas have been installed in the entrance area, the area across the mill race on the other side of Beaver Creek, and at the southern end of the South Trail. All are being used on a regular basis!

A major component of the Park is development of the open area in front of the Mill Buildings into a horticultural/garden area designed by David Culp, a horticulturalist of international renown and resident of our Township. Locally, David is an instructor at Longwood Gardens and is involved with Winterthur; additionally, his company supplied the plants for the Highline in New York City, which contains many of the features he'd like to bring into the design at the Park. His involvement in the Park project is a huge asset to us and we anticipate that it will create a horticultural destination in its own right.

This area of the Park will include Event Areas for weddings, music events, craft festivals, and art display areas where local artists can participate in a semi-permanent revolving art display program.

A dedicated group of volunteers with support from the Township is at the core to the progress that has been made and continues to be made in developing the Park. They meet at the park every Monday morning. You are welcome to come out and help. The Bondsville Mill Park Committee meets at the Township Building every fourth Thursday of the month at 8:00am. Financial



support would also be greatly appreciated; tax deductible donations can be made to the Park through the East Brandywine Foundation (which has 501(c)(3) status), with the Bondsville Mill Park earmarked on the donation. These donations are vital to continuing work towards bringing to full fruition the goals of providing an educational experience regarding the heritage of the regional mill industry and the local natural environment for our current and future generations.

## No Wipes In the Pipes

### *Crusade to Promote Sewer Friendly Behaviors*

**A**LL WHO ATTENDED the Township’s Community Day in the Park enjoyed the Municipal Authority’s fun display on what not to put into the toilet. Children watched a demonstration of the dissolvability of toilet paper versus wipes, and had fun learning about what belongs in the trash while playing the trash can/toilet toss game. The two main sewer issues facing the Municipal Authority are the proper disposal of pre-moistened wipes on the market and FOG (Fats, Oil & Grease). That’s why the Municipal Authority joined forces with the Patty Potty “No Wipes in The Pipes” crusade to promote sewer friendly behaviors.

There are “wipes” for virtually every household and personal hygiene purpose. The original product was intended as a handy diaper clean-up for babies and young children, meant to be folded into the disposable diaper and discarded in the trash. During the last decade, however, marketers have targeted adults to offer products intended to supplement or replace toilet paper.



Convenience and “clean” appear to trump all other purchase motivations. Unfortunately, when it comes to supposedly “flushable” wipes, many of these manmade fiber products turn out to be nearly indestructible.

*Even if a product says it is “flushable”... unless it is toilet paper, it should not be flushed!*

Putting wipes down toilets may plug sewers and cause raw sewage to back up into the home. These wipes may flush down, but they don’t flush out. Wipes don’t decompose—they get caught up in wastewater treatment plant screens and filters, and that costs lots of money to clean and repair, especially when these wipes mix with another sewer enemy—FOG. This translates into sewer fee increases for customers.

Whether you’re on public or on-lot sewer, being conscientious and taking preventative actions will help prevent costly plumber bills and treatment plant repairs and help protect water quality and the environment. But situations do occur where you need to be informed quickly or need to have help get to you ASAP! There are ways you can be prepared!

## READY CHESCO.ORG

ReadyChesCo is used to notify you during a major crisis or emergency, and delivers important emergency alerts, such as weather, road closures, health, or community alerts. You can choose to sign up by county, municipality, or by topic. Notifications and updates to you on all your devices:

- email account (work, home, other)
- cell phone (via SMS)
- pager

## SMART911.COM

Smart911 is a new service in Chester County that allows you to create a Safety Profile at [www.smart911.com](http://www.smart911.com) that includes details you want the 9-1-1 center and public safety response teams to know about your household in an emergency. This information is secure, and is only shared during an emergency with responders.



When you dial 9-1-1, from a phone associated with your Safety Profile, infor-

mation you have entered automatically displays to the 9-1-1 call taker, allowing them to send responders up-to-date location and emergency information. With your Safety Profile, responders can arrive aware of many details they would not otherwise know. Fire crews can arrive knowing exactly how many people live in your home and where the bedrooms are located. EMS personnel can know family members' allergies or specific medical conditions. ## HOUSE CHECK REQUEST AND ALARM REGISTRATION

Our own East Brandywine Police Department will check on your home when you travel or are away for an extended period. A daily check is provided for up to 30 days and then a weekly check if you are gone longer than a month. Do you have an alarm system?
