## The Spotted Lanternfly

*Invasive Pest Threatens Crops, Trees, & More*

**T**HE SPOTTED LANTERNFLY is the latest invasive insect pest threatening our natural habitats, managed landscapes, and farms and forests. This is potentially the worst invasive pest since the introduction of the gypsy moth nearly 150 years ago. This Asian planthopper was found for the first time in the United States in Berks County, Pennsylvania, in 2014. It has since spread throughout 13 counties in southeastern Pennsylvania, currently under quarantine, including Chester County. The insect has recently been found in New Jersey and Virginia.

This insect threatens not only about \$18 billion of agricultural products in Pennsylvania, but it can make outdoor areas unusable by excreting a sticky substance called honeydew, which serves as a host for sooty mold. The presence of Spotted Lanternfly could threaten the shipment of goods over state lines and from the port of Philadelphia, should restrictions be placed on the movement of Pennsylvania products.

Since it is new to the United States, little is known about its behavior and biology, but researchers in the Penn State College of Agricultural Sciences and United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) are working tirelessly to gather scientific data on how to contain and manage this pest. The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture (PDA) and USDA are leading the strategy and implementation of containment and control efforts, while the college focuses on research, education, and outreach.

Working with PDA and USDA, Penn State Extension has launched a spotted lanternfly website, [EXTENSION.PSU.EDU/SPOTTED-LANTERNFLY](http://EXTENSION.PSU.EDU/SPOTTED-LANTERNFLY), that serves as the primary hub for the most up to date information on this insect. To help stop the spread, the public can visit this website to learn how to identify spotted lanternfly and to report any potential sightings for action by PDA. We need your help in fighting this pest immediately as September through December is their egg laying season. **Please call the Penn State Extension at (888) 422-3359 to report sightings.**

	<p><b>STEP ONE: KNOW WHAT TO THROW</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>Paper &amp; Cardboard:</b> Flattened cardboard, newspapers, magazines, office paper and common mail.</li> <li>• <b>Metal Cans:</b> Beverage and food cans.</li> <li>• <b>Plastic Bottles &amp; Jugs:</b> Food and liquid containers with the lids on.</li> </ul>
	<p><b>STEP TWO: EMPTY, CLEAN &amp; DRY</b></p> <p>Just one dirty bottle or can contaminates a whole recycle truck.</p>
	<p><b>STEP 3: KEEP IT LOOSE</b></p> <p>Never put recyclables in containers or bags.</p>



# EAST BRANDYWINE TOWNSHIP

## Recycling & Trash Programs

### RECYCLING

**THURSDAY** is the pick up day for curbside recycling removal.

In 2016 Township, with assistance from the PA Department of Environmental Protection, purchased and distributed new containers, also called "Toters," to all residents except those in townhomes without garages. Call the Township at (610) 269-8230 to report lost, damaged, or missing Toters.

The Township has two sizes of recycle Toter: 35- and 64-gallon. Most homes have the 64-gallon variety. Homes with very long driveways, and the homes of senior citizens or individuals with mobility disabilities may request the smaller size.



All residents must participate in our recycling program per PA law. Recycling also significantly reduces the Township's tipping fees for garbage at the landfill--Keeping your annual fees low!

The annual fee for recycling is only \$70.00 per residence.

### RECYCLABLE ITEMS

#1 thru #7 plastics: Such as milk, water and soda bottles; laundry care products; and food containers.

Clear, green & brown glass: Such as beer, liquor and soda bottles as well as food jars

Aluminum, steel & tin: Such as beverage and food cans.

Mixed paper: Such as newspapers, magazines, phone books, catalogs, cereal boxes, grocery bags, home or office paper, books, envelopes, letters, junk mail, wrapping paper, and similar paper products.

Cardboard (small boxes): These must be flattened and tied.

Very large corrugated or cardboard boxes must be flattened and taken to the East Brandywine Township building (**not accepted at curbside**).

### PREPARING RECYCLABLES

Cans, bottles, jars and plastics should be rinsed clean.

Compress plastics and cans to reduce volume; do not break glass.

### CURBSIDE PICK UP

Place recyclables at curbside on **WEDNESDAY** evening or before 5:30 A.M. Thursday morning for pick up **THURSDAY**.

### TRASH REMOVAL

**THURSDAY** is the pick up day for both curbside recycling and trash removal.

Annual fee for trash removal is only \$165.00 per residence.

### WEEKLY TRASH PICK UP

Put your trash at curbside on **WEDNESDAY** evening or early **THURSDAY** morning; the hauler starts at 5:30 A.M.

Weekly limit is the equivalent of three 35 gallon containers or bags from each residence.

May substitute one three foot by three foot securely tied bundle for one 35 gallon container or bag.

As the Township will pay landfill tipping fee (the cost per ton cost to use the landfill), The hauler will strictly enforce the limit.

By recycling, you can avoid exceeding the allowable amount of trash. Paper accounts for 35% of our waste.

### BULK TRASH PICK UP

Bulk Trash accepted on the last pick up day of each month.

One large item permitted each month, or the equivalent of two 35 gallon or bags in addition to weekly limit.

Weight limited to an item two people can easily lift.

### ACCEPTABLE BULK TRASH

Furniture, small appliance, water heater, or similar item.

Any air conditioner, refrigerator or freezer must display a sticker certifying the removal of the refrigerant ("freon") by an authorized dealer or repair facility.

### UNACCEPTABLE TRASH

Automotive parts, tires, building materials, etc.

Leaves and similar compostable materials.

Christmas trees are accepted at the Municipal Complex after Christmas until late February for composting.

Items included in the Covered Device Recycling Act (Act 108) of 2010, namely: desktop computers; laptop computers; computer monitors; computer peripherals; tablets; televisions; and e-readers.

### YARD WASTE

The township offers leaf collection once in the spring and for three weeks in the fall (dates are always announced on [www.ebrandywine.org](http://www.ebrandywine.org)). For those collections, residents are encouraged to place leaves on their lawns within 6 feet of the edge of the road. Road crews then use a leaf vac to pick up all the leaves.



Visit [www.ebrandywine.org](http://www.ebrandywine.org) to learn about limited Wood Chipping service available to residents.

As a new service to residents, there will be an additional monthly pick-up of certain bagged yard waste during the spring through early fall. This service is offered six times a year-- typically on the last Saturday of the month. Please check the website for exact dates.

### HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE, DOCUMENT SHREDDING, & E-WASTE

### COMMERCIAL

Commercial Properties are those properties used primarily for commercial or industrial purposes.

All commercial properties must recycle aluminum cans, newspapers, plastic containers, and green, brown and clear glass containers, corrugated paper, and high-grade office paper. All commercial properties must contract with a licensed collector to provide recycle services OR utilize the Township's Curbside Service. To use the Township's Curbside Service commercial properties must meet both of these requirements:

- The volume of recyclable materials generated at the commercial establishment will fit in the Township-provided containers; and
- The commercial establishment has access to a curbside location.

Instructions for commercial properties who utilize the Township Curbside Recycle Service are the same those listed for residential customers.

All commercial establishments may use the recycle drop-off facility located at 1214 Horseshoe Pike.

## EAST BRANDYWINE'S OPEN SPACE PROGRAM

### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

At the special Town Hall Meeting held in June 2018, we learned there is very favorable support of the Open Space program and that residents wanted to learn more. Below are answers to commonly asked questions.

**How many acres in the Township are permanently protected from future development?** Over 1,000 acres are currently protected, which includes Township parks, Open Space Program acquisitions, agricultural/land trust easements, and homeowner association land.

**How many acres are permanently protected via the Open Space Program?** To date, 11 properties representing 322 acres have been protected.

**How are Open Space Program acquisitions funded?** In November 2002, voters overwhelmingly approved a referendum to enact a 0.125% Township earned income tax to fund Open Space Program acquisitions. For many of the acquisitions, the Township has applied for and received significant grants from the County and State open space programs.

**Who owns the Open Space Program properties?** In most cases, Open Space funds are used to purchase the development rights. The land is still owned by the original property owner. Like any other property, it can be passed

## East Brandywine Baptist Church

*Celebrating 175 Years of Worship*



**O**N A PARCEL of land along Horse-shoe Pike (Route 322) bought for \$1, the church still officially known as The Brandywine Baptist Church of the County of Chester, was founded 175 years ago. Today, East Brandywine Baptist Church, has expanded far beyond the original 49 members, some of whom still have third and fourth generations of their family as members. More than 400 people currently attend the two services each Sunday.

Over the years, the church has been led by many pastors and deacons. In the early 1900's there was a period where only 13 members kept the church going. Current leader, Pastor Brian Fuller, credits "the faithful few who kept it growing while the Lord's grace sustained us." The original church building named "The Brandywine Baptist Meeting House" was completed in 1843 and hosted services, Sunday school, and various 'singing' schools in the early years.

In 1968 the new church was built to meet the needs of a growing community. The old church was rented to a preschool until 1991. The congregation decided it was too costly to renovate, so it was demolished. In 2017, East Brandywine Historical Society erected a historical marker on the site of the original church.

Each year on Halloween the church hosts their Annual Harvest Festival, open to all members of the community. It is a fun, safe way to celebrate Halloween. **This year they will be hosting "Christmas in East Brandywine" December 21-24. Friday and Saturday there will be a live nativity, free gift wrapping, hay rides and caroling. There will be a special Christmas Worship Service on Sunday, December 23 and Christmas Eve services at 4 and 6 pm.**

Pastor Fuller tells us "The Lord has been faithful & good to us. We have generations of family to pass along the history of our church. Music worship is still a very important part of the church today as it was when the singing schools were established. We have a student ministry and discipleship outreach. Our congregation continues to grow through God's grace."

# Stormwater Management Simplified


*Making it Easier for Homeowners to Protect Our Natural Resources*

**S**TORMWATER MANAGEMENT IS the effort to reduce runoff of rainwater or melted snow into streets, lawns and other sites and the improvement of water quality, according to the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

When stormwater is absorbed into the soil, it is filtered and ultimately replenishes aquifers or flows into streams and rivers. However, when heavy rainwater hits, ground saturated by water creates excess moisture that runs across the surface and into storm sewers and road ditches. This water often carries debris, chemicals, bacteria, eroded soil, and other pollutants, and carries them into streams, rivers, lakes, or wetlands. In communities and watersheds across PA, federal and state regulations place requirements on development, but stormwater management is the responsibility of municipal governments and individual property owners.

At their October 18th public meeting, the Board of Supervisors enacted an ordinance amendment creating a Simplified Method for Stormwater Management. This revision to our existing Stormwater Management regulations will allow residents to complete a stormwater management application for small projects creating less than 2,000 square feet of impervious surface, or more than 5,000 square feet, but less than 10,000 square feet of earth disturbance, without the need to provide an engineered stormwater management plan.

A table, based on the soils in our area, is provided as part of the application packet. The infiltration trench will be 4 feet deep with 1 foot of soil and turf cover. The length and width of the infiltration trench will be based on the area of new impervious surface and/or earth disturbance created by their project, such as a deck, patio or swimming pool. In their stormwater application, a sketch plan of the infiltration trench will be located on the lot, showing the dimensions of the trench, and its location relative to other structures on the lot. down to future generations or sold. A conservation easement is attached to the property's deed to prevent future development in perpetuity. In unique situations, Open Space funds are used to make an outright purchase of a property (e.g., Bondsville Mill Park).

**Can the public access Open Space Program properties?** Land protected via Open Space Program conservation easements remain as private properties. As part of the process, rights-of-way are established for future construction of public access Township trails.

**Which properties are being considered for protection under the Open Space Program?** The Open Space Committee has contacted property owners of parcels of 10+ acres which met certain protection criteria. The Committee also evaluates other parcels when contacted by the property owner. Discussions between property owners and the Open Space Committee are confidential. These conversations often take place over a few years. The identity of a property owner and financial terms becomes public record at the time the Open Space Committee makes a formal acquisition recommendation to the Board of Supervisors. After settlement closing, the acquisition is highlighted in *The Milemarker*.
