### NEW TRASH PICKUP DAY IN 2020

#### TUESDAY WILL BE THE NEW DAY

Starting December 31, 2019 East Brandywine Township will have a new trash and recycling pickup day—Tuesday. Wednesday will be the new make-up day for collections when inclement weather or holidays disrupt the routine.

This new pickup day is not the only change related to waste disposal. The team who does the collecting will also be changing in 2020. See the article on page 4 for the whole story.

#### SPECIAL COLLECTION ON DEC 31

On December 31 the team at A.J. Blossenski will be making their first collection of trash and recycling. The last collection by Republic Services will be on Friday, December 27 due to the Christmas holiday that week. The next regularly scheduled collection by A.J. Blossenski will be on Tuesday, January 7.

## Township Awarded \$33,200 Grant Toward Acquisition of Hess Farm

*Over 25% of acreage in Township now secured as open space*

**T**HE TOWNSHIP AND Open Space Committee are pleased to announce the acquisition of a conservation easement on a 16.6-acre parcel using Open Space Program funds. The property is located at 580 Buck Road, near the intersection of Rock Raymond Road. This property was very attractive to the Open Space Committee since it was adjacent to 200+ acres already preserved in the southeast section of the Township. The Chester County Brandywine Headwaters Preservation program awarded \$33,200 in grant funding towards the purchase.



Albert and Kate Hess purchased the Farm in 1954 from Walter Graham, who had additional property holdings along Rock Raymond Road. According to Sue Bowar, heir to their estate, “The farm has always brought much happiness to our family. It is full of fond memories of family gatherings and my grandmother’s wonderful cooking! Although never farmed, there were horses for most of the Hess’ years there. Albert loved the farm more than anything and could always be found outside in the fields, woods, or barn doing something! We are most grateful to the Township Supervisors and the Open Space Committee for giving us, and the community, the opportunity to keep it forever as it is, never to be built upon.”

With this acquisition, the Township has secured 150 parcels of open space totaling 1,818 acres, or 25.4% of 7,146 total acres in East Brandywine Township.

## Buyer Beware

*Non-certified smoke alarms & CO detectors sold online*

**T**HE INSTITUTE OF Fire Engineers has alerted us to a range of smoke and carbon monoxide alarms being sold on e-commerce sites that do not meet current product safety standards. Smoke and CO detectors should be tested by nationally recognized testing laboratories such as UL or ETL and meet the ANSI/UL 217 or 2034 standards. When they have not been tested and certified there is no verification they will operate as required by these standards, creating a potentially deadly scenario. Before purchasing a smoke or CO detector or alarm online, please do your research to be sure the unit has received third-party verification to meet current standards. **For more on fire prevention please go to the National Fire Prevention Association at [NFPA.ORG](http://NFPA.ORG).**



## Safety First: Resources to Keep Your Family and Home on Alert and Safe



**READY CHESCO** is used to notify you during a major crisis or emergency, and delivers important emergency alerts; such as weather, road closures, health, or community alerts. You can choose to sign up by county, municipality, or by topic. Notifications and updates to you on all your devices:

email account (work, home, other), cell phone (via SMS), pager. Registration takes only a few minutes! You can register by visiting [WWW.READYCHESCO.ORG](http://WWW.READYCHESCO.ORG).



**SMART911** is a Chester County Service that allows you to create a Safety Profile at [www.smart911.com](http://www.smart911.com) with specific details you

want the 9-1-1 center and public safety response teams to know about your household in an emergency. This information is secure and is only shared during an emergency with responders. When you dial 9-1-1 from a phone associated with your Safety Profile, information you have entered automatically displays to the 9-1-1 call taker, allowing them to send responders up-to-date location and emergency information. With your Safety Profile, responders can arrive aware of many details they would not otherwise know. Fire crews can arrive knowing exactly how many people live in your home and where the bedrooms are located. EMS personnel can know family members' allergies or specific medical conditions. ## Volunteer Spotlight—Sandy Moser

*Leading and educating with passion*

**S**TOP IN AT the Bondsville Mill Park on a Saturday morning and Sandy Moser will be happy to tell you about the native plants she has incorporated into the Park’s garden beds. Or her work on attracting 10 species of butterflies, dragonflies, hummingbirds, and other pollinators to the Park. Or the important role all of it plays in supporting our local ecosystem. Although her role as Garden Master of the Park is one of her current volunteer positions in East Brandywine—it isn’t the first—and likely won’t be the last.

Sandy and her husband moved to East Brandywine in 1972—47 years ago. She can remember when she couldn’t even get a babysitter to come out to the ‘country’ to watch her sons. The beauty of this rural community is what brought her here, and the importance of caring for the space around us is why she has been a major force on so many committees in the Township and surrounding communities.

As an original member of the Municipal Authority, and Vice-chair since its inception in 1999, Sandy’s focus has been in safeguarding the Townships ground water resources. In the early 2000s, she was instrumental in campaigning to prevent Philadelphia Suburban Water Company from withdrawing up to 4 million gallons of water a day from the East Branch of Brandywine Creek.

“Many property owners in East Brandywine depend on well water,” says Sandy. “Helping residents understand the importance of caring for our septic

systems—on lot and municipal—is crucial to protecting our water resources.”

Sandy has served on the boards of the Planning Commission and the Ordinance Task Force. She has watched the Township transform under her tenure—and admits while the committees didn’t always get what they asked for, “the Board of Supervisors always stood behind our efforts to keep East Brandywine Township a very livable community.”

Jim Buczala, who has also served on multiple committees in the Township, shared, “I’ve known Sandy for quite some time. She is a doer. More than that, she is a leader who is passionate about the projects she’s working on and drives them forward with a momentum that others need to catch up with!”

Sandy’s love of nature has led her to serve as the PA Game Commission’s Beaver Creek Eagle Nest Monitor and as a volunteer at Main Line Animal Rescue. She was also the Township chair for Operation Christmas Package—a group launched to gather gifts and cards for US servicemen and women in Iraq.

Serving as a board member for Brandywine Hospital, she was involved for many years in planning of the annual Strawberry Festival. She also worked

with Representative Joe Pitts to collect and deliver \$2.3 million worth of donated hospital equipment and humanitarian aid to Mongolia.

The list goes on for this woman who serves with unmatched excitement and energy.

“I enjoy making things come together. And in educating others about these causes and the reasons they are important to our daily lives.”

Sandy’s influence on our Township has had major impact—and we thank her for caring so much about the community in which we live, work and play. If you see her in the Park, be sure to say hello!



**OPEN SPACE COMMITTEE:  
WE NEED YOU!**

Openings are available on the East Brandywine Township Open Space Committee. No specific qualifications are required other than good communication skills and a passion for preserving open space in our Township. Committee responsibilities:

- The Committee is the primary liaison between property owners and the Township staff/Board of Supervisors regarding open space initiatives.
- Committee members are assigned to work with property owners to explore their land conservation options and to explain the end-to-end process.
- Committee members evaluate property appraisal reports and conservation easement documents. Ultimately, the Committee recommends expenditure of Township Open Space funds to the Board of Supervisors.
- The Committee keeps abreast of relevant proposals coming before the Planning Commission.
- Interaction with the Trails Committee regarding the acquisition of trail easements, proposed routes and construction.

**New Contract for East Brandywine Township's Solid Waste Program**

*A.J. Blosenski to take over from Republic Services*

**O**N OCTOBER 3 the Board of Supervisors voted to award a three-year contract to collect curbside trash and recycling to the apparent low bidder, A.J. Blosenski, Inc. of Elverson. Pennsylvania's Second-Class Township Code requires municipalities to bid out this service no less frequently than every five years. Municipalities are further required to contract with the lowest qualified bidder.



Starting January 2020, A.J. Blosenski will be picking up trash on Tuesdays.

In addition to the anticipated change to who collects your trash and recycling, there will be a change to when this is done—the new trash and recycling day will be Tuesday. Wednesday will be the new make-up day for collections when inclement weather or holidays disrupt the routine.

The Township's contract leaves decisions about truck routes and collection time of day up to the waste hauler, so be sure to get in to the habit of leaving your trash and recycling by the curb the night before trash day even if you are accustomed to the trucks rolling by in the afternoon on trash day. All containers currently in use can continue to be used for trash and recycling.

If the name A.J. Blosenski sounds familiar, it is because from 2000 through 2014 they were the Township's solid waste hauler. Republic Services, our current solid waste hauler held the contract from 2015 to 2019.

In response to the recent volatility in the market in recyclable materials, for the first time this contract cycle the Township separated the costs of processing and marketing our single-stream recyclable materials from the costs associated with curbside collection and transportation.

The Township anticipates joining a multi-municipal consortium to negotiate the best price from area materials recovery facilities (MRFs). Beginning January 1, our single-stream recyclables will be routed to TotalRecycle in Birdsboro instead of the MRF operated by Republic Services in King of Prussia. This change in processing facilities may result in slight changes in the way we prepare our materials. Be sure to watch for updates in the Milemarker, at our website, and on our Facebook page in the coming year.

## East Brandywine's Road Crew Wins National Recognition

*Innovative crew members awarded again for their invention*

**A**S REPORTED IN the Summer 2019 issue of *The Milemarker*, earlier this year the Township's Road Department won PennDOT's Build a Better Mousetrap Contest at the PA State Association of Township Supervisors' Excellence Awards. The Contest recognizes projects built and designed by municipal employees to improve safety, reduce costs or increase efficiency.




Derrick Claas and Kyle Mortzfield, two Road Department employees, developed an innovative way to store four salt spreaders when the department ran out of storage space in the 6-bay garage. The portable storage rack, which can be moved by only one person, was made of scrap lumber and \$50 purchased wheels.



On September 10, the Road Department received an announcement from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) they had won the National Build a Better Mouse-trap competition. Matt Van Lew, Township Roadmaster, said, "We did not even know there was a national competition. Our application at the state level made us eligible for the national contest."

Since the announcement by the FHWA, the road crew has been featured in two articles and participated in an Innovation Exchange Webinar in October.

Van Lew shared, "The Road Department is proud of their accomplishments and their ability to serve the residents of East Brandywine Township." Congratulations again to our Road Crew Members! ### HISTORICAL COMMISSION ADDS DECEMBER SPEAKER

**ANGEL AT PHILADELPHIA: WILLIAM STILL AND THE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD**

Between 1830 and 1863 nearly 9,000 runaway slaves escaped to freedom using southeastern Pennsylvania's Underground Railroad. William Still, a free black Philadelphian, directed this so-called "Eastern Line" maintaining an extensive network of communication with those who opened their homes to fugitives, providing food, shelter and clothing. Still also interviewed every one of the nearly 1,000 runaways who came under his care.

Dr. William Kashatus, historian, educator and former Director of Educational and Public Programs at the Chester County Historical Society will discuss the history and operation of the Underground Railroad's Eastern Line. Dr. Kashatus will also talk about his recent statistical study of the 995 runaways Still interviewed, which challenges the existing historiography of the Underground Railroad.

## New Programs at Bondsville Mill Park

*Nature library, story time & L.L. Bean outdoor discovery events*

**AWARENESS OF BONDSVILLE** Mill Park grows in our community and the region. Information about the Park is distributed through a variety of networking paths, including articles in the Daily Local, Community Courier, and our own Milemarker. Representation at community events in the region and participation in phone apps such as the Brandywine Greenway app and AllTrails.com, increased followers at our Facebook page and on our list for weekly email blasts to our “Friends of the Park” group. **Recommendation by visitors to the Park is one of the best ways word is getting out!**

The increased awareness and interest in the Park, and its beautiful gardens and trails, has fed the development of organized events. We had three events at the Park this Fall that required registration. They utilized the newly renovated Spinning Room (Building A) of the historic Mill:

- Monarch Butterfly Migration
- Monarchs and Milkweed (the life cycle of the butterfly)
- Honeybees: the life cycle of the honeybee, their community, and issues related to their survival

(Note that the two butterfly programs included the tagging of Monarchs before they set off on their journey to Mexico!)

It has also facilitated visits by groups like the Berks Community Strollers, Elverson Walking Club, the Downing-

town Library, geocache enthusiasts, photographers, birding groups, and lots of dog walkers!

In addition to planned teaching events the Park is partnering with organizations geared towards getting people and kids into the outdoors:

- **Forest School for All:** It is an outdoor based child-led education program designed to get the kids outdoors in a learning environment where they take on projects that require interaction with the environment and have time for free play in the outdoors. The group meets every Tuesday morning (rotating with two other area parks; they meet every third Tuesday at our Park). - **L.L. Bean Outdoor Discovery Programs:** Monthly outdoor events (e.g., hiking focused on bird watching, tree and plant identification, and wildlife); tentatively scheduled to start this Winter, with an event every second Saturday of the month. We will broadcast information about this program as it becomes available on our Facebook page and our “Friends of the Park” network.

# EB Township Police News

*Police are awarded law enforcement accreditation for 2nd time*

**WE ARE PROUD** to announce the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission (PLEAC) presented the East Brandywine Township Police Department their Certificate of Re-Accreditation during its quarterly commission meeting in October. The Department received its initial award in 2016.



The Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association (PCPA) introduced the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Program in 2001. Today, the program has 140 professional standards that must be met in order to become an accredited police agency. These standards are designed to address four critical areas of Police operations: Organization and Management, Law Enforcement Functions, Staff Support Responsibilities, Pennsylvania Legal Mandates.

Each Police Department must develop a policy to address each of the 140 standards and 100 sub-sections of these standards. They must then show compliance within each policy and sub-section by providing multiple examples (proofs) of each, such as police reports, photos, videos, observations and interviews. The 3-year accreditation period requires approximately 7,500 proofs of compliance. Out of approximately 1200 law enforcement agencies in the State of Pennsylvania, East Brandywine Township Police Department became the 107th agency to be recognized by PLEAC with the coveted accreditation status. Today, 117 Police agencies are accredited, with only 6 of those being in Chester County.

The men and women of the East Brandywine Township Police Department are very proud of our accomplishment of obtaining Law Enforcement Accreditation. Accreditation represents part of our promise to you, the residents and businesses of East Brandywine Township, that we will provide the utmost in professional law enforcement services and that we will do whatever it takes to make East Brandywine Township a safer place to live.
