Brandywine Wallace 5th Graders Help Save Lives

Raised Funds to Buy AED for Bondsville Mill Park

EVERY FEBRUARY, GYM class at Brandywine Wallace Elementary School (BW) focuses on the heart. Students learn about heart health, participate in activities such as Jump Rope for Heart, and raise money for heart related charities.

Led by gym teachers Rhonda Tredway and Mark Young, this year the fifth-grade class at BW raised over \$1,000

for their chosen charity, Aidan's Heart Foundation (AHF). This amount covers the cost of an AED, an automated external defibrillator. An AED is used to help those experiencing sudden cardiac arrest (SCA). It's a sophisticated, yet easy-to-use, medical device that can analyze the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electrical shock, or defibrillation, to help the heart re-establish an effective rhythm.

On May 19, Brandywine Wallace students and Aidan's Heart Foundation (AHF) presented Hud Volz with an AED to install at Bondsville Mill Park. The classroom that raised the most money chose where to place the AED. We are thrilled to know local students want to keep visitors to our community parks safe!

Sprucing Up East Brandywine Township Parks

TOWNSHIP PARKS SAW a number of improvements and repairs this Spring.

At Spatola, as a result of fallen tree damage, repairs were made to the fence on the rookie field and new trash cans were added to the pavilion. Thanks to generous donations from tennis player Todd Brown and the pickle ball community, wind fencing was added to the tennis courts at Community Park. We are also excited to have a new well dug at the Community Park in preparation for the building of the new comfort station.

In April, the Board of Supervisors approved Chapter 182 as Exhibit A which included a provision prohibiting—“Smoking, Tobacco Use, and Controlled Substances” in all our Parks. Parks and Recreation has displayed signs in our Parks announcing, “Young Lungs at Play—This is a Tobacco Free Zone.”

A big thank you to all the golfers, runners/walkers and sponsors of our Fore the Parks Golf Outing and the 5K Run for the Sun. These two fund raisers help us continue to raise monies for improvements to our playgrounds.

Park volunteers will be trained on using the AED and encourages Mill visitors to look into online training as well. If you are untrained, you



can still use the device to help save a life. Directions are on the equipment. The AED will be installed on the outside wall of the Spinning Room, so it is visible and accessible in case of an emergency.

Aidan's Heart Foundation was established after the unexpected death of seven year old Aidan Silva. He had no history of heart issues and had received a clean bill of health six weeks prior.

"I had no idea about SCA until it happened to Aidan," shares his mother and Board President, Christy Marshall Silva. "Installing AEDs in community access places is important to create a culture in our town to respond to such emergencies and help the rate of survival."

Aidan's Heart Foundation has installed over 100 AEDs in Southeastern Pennsylvania. They administer heart screenings to area youth and also provide CPR training to students and educators at the Marsh Creek Sixth Grade Center. Learn more about Aidan's Heart Foundation at AIDANSHEART.ORG

AS RENOVATION PROGRESSES on the East Brandywine Firehouse, our volunteers are more excited about the possibilities this expanded space will provide not only for the firefighters, but for the entire community.

"The improvements to the firehouse will provide our emergency workers with the facilities to easily and safely do their jobs," says John Edwards, Past Chief, Firefighter, and EMT. "Decontamination rooms, training facilities, lounge areas, sleeping quarters, and private offices will help us to improve the level of service we provide to the community."

Running emergency services for two years during construction hasn't always been easy, but the volunteers are already benefitting from some of the changes. Overhead wires are no longer an issue—making it easier for trucks to get in and out of the facility.

"The new community rooms look amazing," says Edwards. "These rooms will allow area residents the ability to use and rent in the building in ways we've never been able to offer to them before."

Material availability and supply chain issues have resulted in delays in progress and increased expense due to inflation. The original expected Spring opening has moved to later this summer. And for those who have been asking, Edwards assures, the firehouse will not be blue. They are waiting on the additional siding.

FROM THE CHESTER COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT

The Chester County Health Department (CCHD) monitors mosquito populations across the County for presence of West Nile Virus (WNV). Sampling methods include traps to capture adult mosquitoes and collection of larval mosquito samples from stagnant water sources. CCHD also responds to mosquito-related complaints from residents.

If WNV is detected in collected mosquito samples, surveillance around the initial site determines the extent of infection. If additional WNV-infected mosquitoes are found, CCHD begins population control efforts.

CCHD uses Integrated Pest Management (IPM), which may include physical, biological, or chemical control methods. Alternatives to biological and chemical pesticides are considered including local education and outreach for prevention and reduction of breeding sites. Where larvae are found, treatments of the water source are performed using a safe bacterial product containing *Bacillus thuringiensis israeliensis* (Bti) or *Bacillus sphaericus* (Bs), which are naturally occurring soil bacteria.

If sampling continues to detect high levels of WNV-infected mosquitoes the final option is a truck-mounted treatment targeting adult mosquitoes. CCHD will provide ample notification to residents to make them aware of any upcoming treatments.

Make Your Home a Bite-Free Zone

MOSQUITOES LAY EGGS in standing water (water that does not flow). Getting rid of standing water on your property can help decrease the mosquito population, your risk of getting a mosquito-borne disease, and may also help decrease the need for mosquito control sprays in your neighborhood.



- Cover or empty containers such as trash cans, wading pools, wheelbarrows, and pots.
- Turn containers upside down when not in use so they don't collect water.
- Drill holes in the bottom of recycling containers.
- Get rid of old tires.
- Change the water in bird baths every three to five days.
- Check storm drains, window wells, and underneath leaky faucets for standing water.
- Clean roof gutters every year.
- Aerate and/or stock ornamental ponds and fountains with fish.
- Keep swimming pools clean and chlorinated. Make sure that water does not gather on swimming pool covers.
- Treat a pool of standing water that cannot be drained with Bti products. Bti is a naturally occurring bacterial product that kills mosquito larvae and is safe for people, pets, aquatic life, and plants. You can find these products at local lawn and garden supply stores.
- Make sure window and door screens fit tightly to keep mosquitoes out of your home.
- Run electric fans nearby when spending time outdoors. Mosquitoes have trouble flying in strong winds.
- Replace outdoor lights with yellow "bug" lights, which tend to attract fewer mosquitoes than ordinary lights.

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Can I Recycle This?

Answers to the Most Common Recycle Questions

HAVE YOU EVER hesitated when throwing something in the trash, wondering if it could go in the recycling bin instead? It's usually something unusual; something not explicitly on the list provided by the Township. Most of us are motivated to do the right thing for the environment, but can be contaminating our recycle stream by putting inappropriate items in our recycle carts. Here is a brief list to help you with the most commonly questioned items.

SHOULD NOT BE RECYCLED!

Envelope with bubble wrap

Materials recovery centers are highly automated and cannot separate the paper envelope from the glued-on bubble wrap. This packaging belongs in the trash.



Used paper plates, coffee cups, and cartons used for ice cream, juice boxes, and milk

These are food contaminated and belong in the trash.



Film Plastic Bag

Don't be fooled by that number and recycle logo printed on the bag! Film plastic, the thin flexible stuff they make grocery bags



out of, can cause serious damage to the sorting equipment at the materials recovery facility. If you want to keep film plastic out of the landfill, take your bags back to the drop-off boxes offered at many local retailers.

Shredded Paper

While the assorted paper can be recycled, the loose shredded stuff just falls through the sorting equipment at the materials recovery center and contributes to litter in your neighborhood. Consider recycling your shredded paper at the Township's annual shredding event.



Plastic Lids


Just like the shredded paper, this little lid is too small to be processed by the sorting equipment. Put the rinsed, dry, and loose bottle this lid came off of in the recycle cart and chuck this lid in the trash.



CAN BE RECYCLED

Cardboard Rolls

While this old roll can be recycled, the Township can't help you settle that age-old argument about which direction to install the next roll of toilet paper!



Unopened Junk Mail

Feel free to pass on the offer. You can put the unopened junk mail straight in your recycle cart. Get extra planet-saving points for using the OptOutPrescreen.com site to make sure you never get those unsolicited offers again!



Can with lid attached or Formed Metal Can

Put rinsed, dry, and loose cans in the recycle cart. Throw plastic lids in the trash.



Number 6 Plastics

Yes and no. Trick question—both of these cups are marked with a number 6 recycling logo indicating that they are made of polystyrene. The cup on the left is made of lightweight foam and cannot be recycled. The cup on the right is a dense plastic and can be recycled.

Recycling & Trash Programs

RECYCLING

TUESDAY will remain the pick up day for curbside recycling removal in 2022.

In 2016 Township, with assistance from the PA Department of Environmental Protection, purchased and distributed new containers, also called "Toters," to all residents except those in townhomes without garages.

The Township has two sizes of recycle Toter: 35- and 64-gallon. Most homes have the 64-gallon variety however homes with very long driveways, and the homes of senior citizens or individuals with mobility disabilities may request the smaller size.

All residents must participate in our recycling program per PA law. Recycling also significantly reduces the Township's tipping fees for garbage at the landfill--Keeping your annual fees low!

The annual fee for recycling is only \$85.00 per residence.

RECYCLABLE ITEMS

#1 thru #7 plastics: Such as milk, water and soda bottles; laundry care products; and food containers.

Clear, green & brown glass: Such as beer, liquor and soda bottles as well as food jars

Aluminum, steel & tin: Such as beverage and food cans.

Mixed paper: Such as newspapers, magazines, phone books, catalogs, cereal boxes, grocery bags, home or office paper, books, envelopes, letters, junk mail, wrapping paper, and similar paper products.

Cardboard (small boxes): These must be flattened and tied.

Very large corrugated or cardboard boxes must be flattened and taken to the East Brandywine Township building (**not accepted at curbside**).

PREPARING RECYCLABLES

Cans, bottles, jars and plastics should be rinsed clean.

Compress plastics and cans to reduce volume; do not break glass.

CURBSIDE PICK UP

Place recyclables at curbside on **MONDAY** evening for pick up **TUESDAY**.

TRASH REMOVAL

TUESDAY will remain the pick up day for curbside trash removal in 2022.

Annual fee for trash removal is only \$165.00 per residence.

WEEKLY TRASH PICK UP

Put your trash at curbside on **MONDAY** evening; the hauler starts at 5:30 A.M.

Weekly limit is the equivalent of three 35 gallon containers or bags from each residence.

May substitute one three foot by three foot securely tied bundle for one 35 gallon container or bag.

Township will pay landfill tipping fee (per ton cost to dump trash). The hauler will strictly enforce the limit.

By recycling, you can avoid exceeding the allowable amount of trash. Paper accounts for 35% of our waste.

BULK TRASH PICK UP

Bulk Trash accepted on the last pick up day of each month.

One large item permitted each month, or the equivalent of two 35 gallon or bags in addition to weekly limit.

Weight limited to an item two men can easily lift.

ACCEPTABLE BULK TRASH

Furniture, small appliance, water heater, or similar item.

Any air conditioner, refrigerator or freezer must display a sticker certifying the removal of the refrigerant ("freon") by an authorized dealer or repair facility.

UNACCEPTABLE TRASH

Automotive parts, tires, building materials, etc.

Leaves and similar compostable materials.

Christmas trees are accepted at the Municipal Complex after Christmas until late February for composting.

Items included in the Covered Device Recycling Act (Act 108) of 2010, namely: desktop computers; laptop computers; computer monitors; computer peripherals; tablets; televisions; and e-readers.

YARD WASTE

The township offers leaf collection once in the spring and for three weeks in the fall (dates are always announced on www.ebrandywine.org). For those collections, residents are encouraged to place leaves on their lawns within 6 feet of the edge of the road. Road crews then use a leaf vac to pick up all the leaves.

There is an additional monthly pick-up of certain bagged yard waste during the spring through early fall. This service is offered six times a year on the last Saturday of the month. Please check the website for exact dates.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

COMMERCIAL

Commercial Properties are those properties used primarily for commercial or industrial purposes.

All commercial properties must recycle aluminum cans, newspapers, plastic containers, and green, brown and clear glass containers, corrugated paper, and high-grade office paper. All commercial properties must contract with a licensed collector to provide recycle services OR utilize the Township's Curbside Service. To use the Township's Curbside Service commercial properties must meet both of these requirements:

- The volume of recyclable materials generated at the commercial establishment will fit in the Township-provided containers; and
- The commercial establishment has access to a curbside location.

Instructions for commercial properties who utilize the Township Curbside Recycle Service are the same those listed for residential customers.

All commercial establishments may use the recycle drop-off facility located at 1214 Horseshoe Pike.
