Player development is important to us, but not as much as making sure the kids are having fun playing baseball. EBYA is offering a **Winter Development Program** aimed at preparing players for the upcoming Spring travel season for age groups 7U through 12U. The indoor training will be focused on fundamentals, hitting, and pitching.

For the 7u/8u age group, players will be preparing to make the switch from coach/machine pitch to real live baseball. 8u players normally play rookie ball in the Spring but have the option to come to evaluations and qualify for the Minors Division (9 and 10-year-old kid pitch.). All 10 of the players on last year's Bulls 8u Development team qualified for the Minors Division. The 10U players will have the option to qualify for the Majors Division this Spring.


### EAST BRANDYWINE PARKS AND RECREATION

## When Should I Call the Police?

A Message from the East Brandywine Police Department

**O**FTEN WE HEAR that residents do not want to call the Police because they think:

- They are bothering us
- The Police have better things to do than listen to them, or
- They are afraid of becoming embarrassed by reporting something that appears to be mundane.

Some will complain to Township Officials, family members, or neighbors, but they never call the Police. The fact is, many of the incidents that residents observe and fail to report are serious or nuisance crimes that need to be reported the moment they happen. We may already be investigating similar incidents.

So, when should you call the Police? Simply—anytime you witness something that you know is a crime or you know is not “normal daily activity”.

Some are easy. If you see a crime in progress such as a robbery, burglary, theft, or assault. When you witness a

vehicle collision or a truck drops its cargo on the roadway. When you see the UPS driver dropping off a package that someone runs up and takes right after the driver leaves. All are reportable incidents.

But what about the other things? The ones that don't feel right or you are unsure about. Like your neighbor driving his ATV on the road. Or the neighborhood kids ringing doorbells and running away?

What about someone standing in the road taking a picture of your house or the suspicious car parked at the end of your street? Or a solicitor knocking on your door or your neighbor's dog barking at odd hours? Would you report these to the Police? Many people do not. These types of incidents are important to us, so please call us when they occur.

The purpose of the Police Department is to protect and serve. We are here for you and want you to report anything that raises a concern or worry. Do not wait a couple of days and then decide that you probably

should have called. Do not complain to others without picking up the phone to ask for our help. Do not post your observations on our Facebook page or try to Facebook message the PD. **Please pick up the phone and dial 911.**

No matter what the outcome may be, we will investigate the incident, report back to you our findings, and help eliminate any worries.

### WHAT CAN I DO TO HELP?

There are some very basic things you can do to help us when you are a victim or a witness to an incident.

First, if you are in danger move to, or secure yourself in, a safe location so that you are not in harm's way. Please do not take any actions yourself unless your life is in immediate danger of death or serious bodily injury. Call 911 IMMEDIATELY and give as much information to the Police Dispatcher as possible.

The dispatcher will typically ask you to stay on the phone while the Police are responding. The reason for this

#### BEWARE OF GIFT CARD SCAMS

DO NOT make monetary payments using GIFT CARDS or PAY PAL FRIENDS AND FAMILY. You have NO protection or way to recover your money. If someone demands that you make payment to them using these methods, it is most likely a scam.

is that the dispatchers are relaying your information and updates in real-time while we are responding.

Secondly, stay on location if possible, so that the responding Officers can speak with you once they arrive. If you cannot stay, make sure the dispatcher has taken your phone number so that we may call you. The information provided by you is very important. Descriptions of suspects, any weapons, direction of travel, and vehicle descriptions, are examples of important information. Cell phone or Ring camera videos are invaluable to our investigations.

Finally, most people remember details or other information hours or days after an incident. Do not hesitate to call the investigating Officer with the new information. No piece of information is insignificant information. The simplest piece of information may turn out to be the most important in our investigation.

### BEING A WITNESS

We live in a society in which people do not want to get involved. Many incidents and crimes are not reported because people realize they may be needed as a witness. Cases are dismissed because a witness did not want to show up.

We get that people are nervous, are unable to take time off from work, don't want to be the bad neighbor, etc. The fact is, in the majority of cases we deal with, unless you are



the victim or you witnessed a very serious crime, we can initially present our case without needing your testimony. If you need to testify, you will never be alone. We will be with you through the entire process, and we have access to victim/witness advocates who can attend court with you to lend support.

### WE NEED YOU!

In closing, a Police Department's success depends on the help it gets from concerned citizens, residents, and victims who contact the Police *immediately* upon seeing a crime or other suspicious activity. It is important to remember that the sooner an incident is reported the faster we can respond, speak to you, speak to witnesses, and collect information and evidence. It will help cut back the amount of time suspects have to escape the area, cover their tracks, or sell stolen items.

If you need to be a witness, we will support you throughout the process. Our Police Officers care about you and want to protect and serve you. We do not care how insignificant something may seem. We only ask that you call us immediately by dialing 911 and allow us to investigate your concerns promptly so that we can keep you and the rest of our community safe and worry-free.

# The Passion Play

Part of East Brandywine History for 50 Years

**F**OR 50 YEARS, buses filled with avid theatergoers traveled on Horseshoe Pike through Guthriesville headed for the “Passion Play” at Hopewell United Methodist Church. The Passion Play is the theatrical representation of the events of Christian Holy Week.

The play began in the Fellowship Hall on Palm Sunday, April 7, 1963. In 1966, after countless hours of work by church members to create an amphitheater that would seat 1000 people, the Passion Play moved outside. Due to weather considerations, the play moved to summer programming and was performed for three evenings. You can just imagine the number of buses that headed there as those seats were filled. Many people were disappointed when there were no tickets left!

Hopewell was not the first place that held a performance based on the theme. The best-known continues to be regularly presented in the little village of Oberammergau, Germany. Started in 1634, it is presented every 10 years.

The natural contour of the hillside behind the Hopewell Church was a natural setting for an Amphitheater. Thousands of feet of sound and electrical cables were placed underground. Speakers were nestled in trees and lighting was spread throughout the area. The rows of folding chairs on grassy terraces have been replaced by permanent seats. The rock in the garden of Gethsemane weighs over 2 tons and was lowered into place by helicopter in 1988.

In 2005 the Passion Play premiered “The Power and the Glory,” a contemporary translation of the original play. In 2010 Hopewell performers began to present more variety of drama—“Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat” and “Godspell” among others. In 2013 they presented the 50th Anniversary of The Passion Play for the last time. Since then a few musicals have been performed in cooperation with Barley Sheaf Theatre.

The buses are no more, along with The Passion Play, which was a vivid part of East Brandywine’s history.

## Bondsville Mill Park Partners with Longwood Gardens in 2024 Community Read

**BONDSVILLE MILL PARK** is excited to announce its plans for participating in the 2024 Longwood Gardens' award-winning Community Read Program. This program is designed to bring books and people together and spur discussion around an important topic or idea.

For the 2024 Community Read, Longwood Gardens selected two books that exemplify the meaning we all can find in gardens. Inspired by the love of gardens and all that their beauty inspires, each book highlights the restorative and powerful role a garden can play in one's life.

The featured title is *The Last Garden in England* by Julia Kelly. Just as Longwood Gardens has brought beauty to the lives of generations, so too does Highbury House—whose lovely gardens are at the center of this historical fiction spanning three generations. Taking place in 1907, 1944, and the present day, this novel connects five women — from the gardens' original designer through to the modern-day designer charged with restoring their beauty—all of whom find true meaning and solace in the gardens.

For younger readers, Longwood selected *The Secret Garden*, based on the novel by Frances Hodgson Burnett, adapted by Calista Brill and illustrated by Adeline Lirus. This is a beautifully illustrated, condensed picture-book version of the classic children's novel. Young Mary Lennox is sent to live with her uncle in the unfamiliar north of England. She discovers a secret walled garden and learns the power of nature to help restore health and happiness.

Inspired by these books, Bondsville Mill Park volunteers are busily preparing for all ages to engage in important conversations surrounding nature, plants, and gardens. Activities will begin this Spring. They will focus on the restorative aspects of the Mill Park's gardens and surrounding trails, as well as the role the community plays in conserving these areas for generations to come.
