## East Brandywine Community Park Celebrates 35 Years

A Park for Everyone

**C**AN YOU BELIEVE our Community Park is 35 years old? In 1990, East Brandywine Township purchased 30 acres of farmland on Dilworth Road from farm owners Lucile and Ellis Brown. With \$5,000 of support from EBYA, Parks and Recreation hired a bulldozer and the East Brandywine Community Park was born.



The Park, a vision of then-supervisors David Summers, Alan McCausland, and John Cropper, celebrated with a groundbreaking ceremony on an August evening. The driveway was cut in, and the first soccer field was constructed. Named the East Brandywine Community Park, thanks to many volunteer hours, development continued in Phase I (10 acres north of the farm driveway). We leveled and seeded, planted trees, and made our first garden. This flower bed is located behind the Alison Pavilion with a post listing some of the many who donated to our Park.

The Thank You Bed was created as a tribute to all the many individuals and businesses that supported our building efforts, and soon after, we were able to plant our first tree that still stands tall today. Having no public works department, a neighbor across the street came over and mowed our first lawn. Children from Brandywine Wallace helped design our Community Park logo.

As Phase I was completed, we moved onto Phase II (20 acres on the south side of the farm driveway). Professional grading was supplemented with volunteer help to spread topsoil and seed the soccer fields. Volunteers planted trees, put in benches, gardens, and the children's playground. They built the gazebo.

**R**ECENT REPORTS AND questions have prompted the need to clarify the legal use of electric scooters and electric bicycles in our Township. Please contact the Police Department at **(610) 269-4300** with any questions.

Under Pennsylvania law, **electric scooters** are classified as motor vehicles and must meet requirements for registration, insurance, and safety equipment. Most do not qualify and are therefore illegal to operate on public roads or sidewalks. They may only be used on private property with the landowner's permission.

**Electric bicycles (E-bikes)** may be used on public roads and bike lanes, but *not on township trails*, which prohibit motorized vehicles. They are legal if they:

- Weigh under 100 lbs.
- Have operable pedals
- Use a motor under 750 watts
- Do not exceed 20 mph on motor power alone
- The operator is 16 years of age or older

*Electric Scooters and Motorized Pedalcycles are prohibited on township-owned property, including parks and trails.*

Phase III, an additional 30+ acres on the north side of the Park, was purchased by the Township from the Brown Family, making the Park 60+ acres. When completed, our Community Park consisted of 10 playing fields, 2 tennis/pickleball courts, 4 pavilions, 2 playgrounds, a maintenance building, two restrooms, a gazebo, winding walking trails, gardens, benches, and beautiful trees.

Over the years, changes have been made. Where there once were two sand volleyball courts, we now have additional parking. Recently, a new comfort station has been built, a new tot lot added, an additional well, more benches and trees, and new picnic tables. And in 2026, as America celebrates 250 years, we are excited to install the "United We Play" All-Abilities Playground.

What has not changed in the 35 years is the enjoyment that our community receives from the Park. We continue to benefit from Eagle and Gold Scout projects, volunteers who help keep our gardens beautiful, and donations of trees and benches. Whether walking on the trails, enjoying a gathering in a pavilion, attending a movie or concert, playing soccer, baseball, softball, or tennis—there is something for everyone at the Community Park.

The vision that began 35 years ago will keep on developing and expanding as we continue the mission of providing a Community Park for everyone.

## Remembering Carol Sinex Schmidt

**THE EAST BRANDYWINE** Township Board of Supervisors, Historical Commission, and Staff are deeply saddened to share the news of the passing of Carol Sinex Schmidt on June 26, 2025.

Born on August 12, 1947, in Darby Hospital, Carol lived in Downingtown/East Brandywine Township for most of her life. She graduated from Downingtown High School in 1965 and then from Immaculata College with a degree in Business at the age of 60.

Carol was co-owner of *Trade Talk* newspaper and Hope Ambulance in Guthriesville. She worked as an administrative assistant at both Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church and Main Line Unitarian Church, served as president of Business & Professional Women for many years, and was on the Board of Directors for Steeple to People Ministries for over 30 years. Yet for all her service, when you spoke with Carol, you immediately understood her family was her priority, and how all whom she met became her friend. She had a lively personality and a huge heart.

A passionate steward of our local history, Carol was proud to share that her family owned the Lyndell Country Store and Frank's Folly campground, both in EBT, and that she was one of the first women firefighters in Chester County at the EB Fire Company. She was enormously proud of being a Sinex and being related to Lt. Col. Joseph Sinex, who



played a key role in the Battle of Gettysburg, commanding the regiment that crucially held the position of Little Round Top against Confederate attacks.

Carol had deep roots in the historical community of the Township. She was a member of the EBT Historical Society in the 1980s, then joined the Historical Commission (HC) in 2012. When the HC decided to provide programs about our local history to the Township's residents, Carol took the lead. The HC Speakers Series became her program, which she continued to manage after leaving the HC at the end of 2016 until her passing. This program has run for over 10 years, with six programs per year. As part of the public outreach that started with this program, she created the Historical Commission newsletter and was the driving force behind the Oral History Project.

John Black, Chairman of the HC, remembers, "Carol was a wonderful person. She loved people and local history. She volunteered hours of time arranging interesting speakers for the Speakers Series for us all to enjoy. She was a pleasure to know and will be greatly missed."

HC Vice-Chair Jim Buczala shares, "It has been a great pleasure to develop a friendship with Carol over the past 13 years (through the HC and a personal friendship outside of it). My lasting memories of her will be her love of family (she spoke of them in always loving terms), her value for the importance of history and instilling that value in others, her positive, forward-looking mindset, taking things as they came and making the best of a situation, and her genuine desire to connect with people. She was someone you could count on to follow through with her commitments."

Carol preserved the stories of our past and brought our community together in meaningful conversation. She was so fervent in her love of history and dedication to her commitments that, up until the time her illness prevented her from getting out of bed, she was sending historical newsletters to our residents. Her interviews with residents and videos of past speakers can be found on the Township webpage. We will be forever grateful for Carol's contributions to EBT and for having her as part of our community. She will be greatly missed.

## Historical Commission Fall Speakers Series

Programs Held at East Brandywine Township Building

### Symbols, Marks, and Signs Hidden in Open View— A Close Look at Barn Walls and Other Material Surfaces

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 21, 3PM



**M**OST AREAS OF material culture, such as the pre-1900 physical objects created in Pennsylvania, had been studied and written about by the middle third of the 20th century. However, one unexplored area concerns the markings and symbols used by early settlers and homesteaders in countless areas that were believed to promote good luck and ward away evil forces.

#### PRESENTER:

**Greg Huber** is a barn and house historian, an independent scholar, consultant, and principal owner of Past Perspectives and Eastern Barn Consultants—both historic and cultural resource companies based in Macungie, Lehigh County, Pennsylvania. Since 1974, Huber has specialized in pre-Civil War era house and barn architecture of Holland, Dutch, and Pennsylvania Swiss-German areas. He has documented more than 8,000 vernacular buildings, which include more than 5,000 homestead barns.

He has authored more than 340 articles on barn and house architecture and edited and published the first barn research journal from 1991 to 1994. Huber is also the co-author of two books: the second edition of *The New World Dutch Barn* (2001) and *Stone Houses—Traditional Homes of Pennsylvania's Bucks County and Brandywine Valley* (2005). He has also led more than 250 house, barn, and tree tours in the past twenty-five plus years and delivered more than 290 presentations on house and barn architecture. He won the Alice Kenney award in 1997 and the Allen Noble Book Award in 2003, issued by the Pioneer America Society for the best edited book on material culture in North America. Greg Huber's 240-page book, *The Historic Barns of Southeast Pennsylvania—Architecture and Preservation 1750 to 1900*, has achieved #1 on the Amazon best-selling list in the Vernacular Architecture category.

### Historic Bridges of Chester County— Preserving Our Legacy

**T**HE VARIETY OF bridge designs over the history of Chester County is remarkable! Eventually, time wears on them, and their rehabilitation is necessary for them to continue to meet the requirements of the loads they need to carry. But does that mean they should all be replaced with basic plain-Jane bridges? Beyond the often-pleasing aesthetic designs and their association with the setting they're located in, it's important to consider their character-defining features while also providing a bridge that meets the needs of our infrastructure.

#### PRESENTER

**Michael J. Cuddy, PE**, Sr. VP with GFT, coordinates his firm's transportation work throughout Pennsylvania. Mike is responsible for many of its major bridge design, rehabilitation, and inspection programs, and has been the project manager on

notable rehabilitation projects that include Marshall's Road Bridge (right here, in East Brandywine Township), the Wheeling Suspension Bridge (the oldest existing suspension bridge with a span greater than 1000'), and the Frankford Ave Bridge in Philadelphia, built in 1699 and the oldest bridge in America. He is known for his innovative and practical approach to the evaluation and rehabilitation of historic bridges.

### Historic Land Patterns: The Functional Architecture of Our Agricultural Landscapes

SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 16, 3PM

**HAVE YOU EVER** wondered how forested hills were made into lush and green farm fields, or why Chester County barns are shaped a little differently from those in other parts of the state? Have you ever noticed how different the farms are in level areas of central Lancaster County vs the rolling landscape of Chester County farmland? If so, then this talk may be for you.

#### PRESENTER:

**Terry Necciai** is a licensed architect who has specialized in historic preservation and rehabilitation

of small-town business districts for over 40 years and has prepared National Register nominations for over 60 properties, about a third of which were farms or related to farming. He gradually realized that among the most important historic characteristics of many of these farms were field patterns and other landscape features that had been carefully developed for functionality over several generations. In 2011, he was awarded a Charles E. Peterson Fellowship from the Athenaeum of Philadelphia to study this topic in greater depth, resulting in a 200-page study entitled "The Pennsylvania Farm Landscape as a Historic Resource, the Forces that Gave It Shape." He has presented his conclusions at a variety of conferences since then.
